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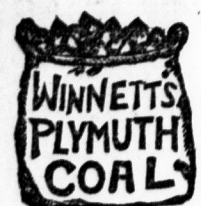

LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—Mayor McCully, of St. Thomas, is in the city.

—Headmaster Merchant, of the Collegiate Institute, was in Toronto to-day.

—Railway men report a big snow storm this morning between here and Niagara Falls.

—John G. Laven, Dominion passenger agent of the M. C. R., is in the city on official business.

—James Bryan, reeve of Lucknow and publisher of the Sentinel, is calling on old friends in the city to-day.

—Jacob E. Goldner, who came here from London to open a cigar store, and who was supposed to have been suffocated by gas at the Commercial Hotel, left an estate valued at \$600. His father has applied for letters of administration. [Woodstock Sentinel-Review.]

—A citizen, writing to the city authorities, asks what use it is to placard a stricken house when the inmates are allowed to go out and mingle with the public. He cites the case of a grocer, who has never in his house and attends to his business just as usual.

—Cousins Boyd got into an ugly altercation with a Goderich man, on the train, coming up from Guelph last night, and called the Lake Huron man by an epithet that was far from gentlemanly. The Goderich man "climbed on" Boyd, as the saying is, and made him wish he had remained silent.

—A meeting is to be held in Ottawa next Monday for the purpose of organizing a Canadian health association similar to those in existence in various States across the line. Addresses will be delivered by Hon. Senator Scott, Hon. David Mills, Dr. Weldon, M.P., Dr. Dromme, M.P., and Sheriff Sweeney.

—There was a little suppressed excitement at the Grand last night when Father Connolly, of Biddulph, arose from his seat and objected to a song which had just been sung as being out of place. The singer afterwards addressed the audience and defended his action. The selection, he said, had been rendered with clerical approval.

—The committee who have in charge the arrangements for the Queen's birthday demonstrations in St. Thomas, have decided to give \$500 in prizes for a uniformed society competition drill. Detroit, Woodstock, London, Hamilton, Toronto, Petrolia, Niagara, Buffalo, Dresden, Windsor, Belleville and Newmarket will be invited to take part. The other features of the celebration will be a societies parade with games at the fair grounds, and the display of capital will also be formally opened on that day.

—Mr. Harvey Kilburn, contractor, and his family were just sitting down to tea last evening when about 25 or 30 relatives and friends from near Byron made a siege on his new home at 34 Ash street, and took formal possession in the name of the social king. A happy time was spent in reminiscence, songs and popular amusements until a seasonable hour. During the evening the contents of several baskets, which the Kilburns had taken completely by surprise, but with their whole-souled hospitality found no trouble in making the evening pass pleasantly.

The Work of the Flames.
After a quiet spell of a week or so the steam had begun to attend to this morning.

They were called out at 5:30 a.m. to save a frame cottage at 594 Pall Mall street from the flames. The building was unoccupied and the fire, which started in the kitchen, was undoubtedly the work of an incendiary. About \$200 worth of damage was done before the blaze was extinguished. The structure was not burned down but the inside was pretty well cleaned out. Richard Vick was taken from the furnace caused a fire at the boiler and engine house of Knowles & Co.'s workshop on Weston street, over Clarke's bridge, this morning about 11 o'clock. The place was a mere frame shell and the fire extended to the corner and roof of the workshop, doing \$25 worth of damage. The engine is not materially injured, but will have to be overhauled.

A Fraternal Visit to Strathroy.
Judge Reynolds, of Brockville, grand juror of the Royal Assizes, accompanied by Past Regents Barram and Bartlett, of this city, went to Strathroy on Thursday and interviewed the members of Strathroy Council and others. Strathroy Council, although not numerically strong, has been and is doing truly fraternal work. The council has for years been paying the assessments of invalid members, which has been a drain upon their funds. This application of the efforts of the members has possibly been the cause of the non-increase of the membership of the council, but will have a contrary effect in the future. The visit of the grand regent was very timely, and mutually agreeable to him and the Strathroy brethren. Bro. J. H. McIntosh, of Strathroy Council, took charge of the evening bringing their stay, and did his duty efficiently.

An Oily Case.
At a sitting of the First Division Court before Judge McKenzie, of Sarnia, there were 32 cases on the list. Those of Robinson, of the Robinson Corset Company, sued Charles Depper & Co. for \$100 damages. Some time ago Robinson wanted a carload of oil to be used in his patent burner, and was told that the specific gravity should be 28. C. Depper & Co. had gone out of the oil business, but through kindness Mr. Depper procured a load of oil for the plaintiff. When it arrived it was found that the specific gravity was only 24. Robinson accepted it and treated it with benzine. When used it damaged his burner and on that account he entered the suit. The judge held that he was entitled to the difference between the prices of the oil fur-

nished and the oil that should have been supplied. Judgment was given for the plaintiff for \$20 and costs.

A Fireman's Uncertainty in Life.
An example of the uncertainty of matters in a fireman's life occurred at No. 3 station to-day, and this is only one of many that happen frequently to these brave men. After getting the apparatus polished and the hall cleaned up on returning from the early morning call (which is a work of several hours), Acting Foreman Thomas Aiken concluded to do likewise to his person. He shaved himself, striped and got into the bath, but before he had time to get more than thoroughly wet, in comes alarm number two. Firemen don't stop to think—they act. So did Tommy. No time to use a towel—he just jumped into his outer garments, and was ready as soon as the horses were hitched. But what a comfort to be out on a raw cold day working at a fire for two hours without a shirt or even any underclothing. The dangers and inconveniences firemen are subjected to are innumerable.

CITY CONTRACTS AWARDED.

No. 2 Committee Holds a Lengthy Session and Decides Who Will Do City Work During 1898.

Ald. Connor (chairman), O'Meara, Jones, Shaw and Garratt, City Council, held a lengthy session last evening's meeting of the Board of Works.

S. H. Craig received the contract for plank walks, material and laying. The prices were as follows: Three foot walks, 12 cents per linear foot; 16½ cents for 4 foot; 20½ cents for 5 foot 4 inches; 24½ cents for 6 foot; 28 cents for 7 foot; 31½ cents for 8 foot; 35 cents for 9 foot; 37½ cents for 10 foot, and 48 cents for 12 foot. Prices for rough lumber were 11½ cents for 3 foot; 13½ cents for 4 foot; 19 cents for 5 foot; 22½ cents for 6 foot; 29 cents for 7 foot; 31½ cents for 8 foot; 34½ cents for 9 foot; 37½ cents for 10 foot, and 46½ cents for 12 foot.

Mr. Shea was awarded the contract for gravel, stones, etc., for wards 1, 2, 4 and 6, except river gravel in No. 1, at the following prices: Ward 1—Pit gravel, screened, \$2.74; unscreened, \$2.18; screenings, \$2.10; paving stones, \$2.69; broken stones, \$5.14; river, screened, \$2.14; unscreened, \$1.84. Ward 2—Screened pit, \$2.25; paving stones, \$2.17; broken stones, \$4.48; river gravel, screened, \$1.79; unscreened, \$1.43. Ward 4—Pit, screened, \$2.37; unscreened, \$1.90; screenings, \$1.90; paving stones, \$2.45; unscreened, \$2.29; Ward 6—Screened, \$2.49; unscreened, \$2.29; screenings, \$2.25; paving stones, \$2.69; broken stones, \$5.14; river gravel, screened, \$1.79; unscreened, \$1.43. Ward 10—Pit, screened, \$2.37; unscreened, \$1.90; screenings, \$1.90; paving stones, \$2.45; unscreened, \$2.29; Ward 12—Screened, \$2.49; unscreened, \$2.29; screenings, \$2.25; paving stones, \$2.69; broken stones, \$5.14; river gravel, screened, \$1.79; unscreened, \$1.43.

Mr. J. Ellement's tender for standard sewer pipe was accepted. The prices were: Four inch, 9½ cents; 6 inch, 12 cents; 8 inch, 17 cents; 10 inch, 25 cents; 12 inch, 33 cents; 15 inch, 48 cents; 18 inch, 65 cents; junctions, 40, 50, 75 cents, \$1.30, \$1.60, \$2.20; elbows, 25, 38, 50, 63 cents traps, \$1.20.

Bowman & Co. will supply the cement. Maurice Baldwin will do the street sweeping.

Ferguson Bros. will supply wards 1, 2 and 6 with lumber, and W. D. Willis, wards 3, 4 and 5.

Tenders for artificial stone walks were referred to the council and tenders for nails were laid over.

M. Baldwin's tender was accepted for cedar block crossings at 63 cents a square yard.

The old property in East London will be rented to A. B. Campbell, at \$26 25 per year.
