ADAM BECK'S HORSE FIRST AT MORRIS PARK.

New York, Oct. 28.—It was more like a day late in summer at Morris Park yesterday, for it was warm and pleasant, and the race was good. The first race was for selling placers, ridden by maiden jockeys, and Peat was a hot favorite. He was very lame going to the post, and did not improve in the race, so that he was a bad fourth. The start was bad, Dormitor opened a big gap in the back stretch, but gradually lost the distance in the turn, and was second to Adam Beck's Wordsworth into the stretch, and thus they finished—the latter winning in a drive. BETTING PRIVILEGES—LEGAL DECISION.

The Queen's Bench division court has given judgment in Stratford Turf Association vs. Fitch. The plaintiffs are the lessees of the Stratford Athletic Company (Limited). The plaintiffs leased to defendants the betting privileges for the race meeting on Aug. 25 and 26, 1898. The action was brought in the ninth division court in the county of Wentworth, to recover \$101 balance due by defendants. Judgment of division court for plaintiffs was affirmed, and appeal of defendants dismissed with costs.

TIPS.

No less than 23 attachments have been taken out against horses at the Windsor track during the past two days. Nearly all the horses have been shipped. The attachments cover bills for groceries, meat, food, veterinary attendance, help, tailors' bills and almost everything else.

WHEEL.

LOWERED THE RECORD.
Alex. Melvor, the Scotch long distance crack, has made a successful attempt to beat the unpaired record made by Dr. W. N. Robertson, of 7 hours and 19 minutes for the journey to Stratford and return. At noon he started from Goderich at 2:51 he reached the Royal Hotel in Stratford, at 3 he started back, and at 5:15 he had completed the journey, thus breaking the record by 1 hour and 24 minutes.

PALMER BREAKS RECORD.

London, Oct. 28.—At the Crystal Palace, Palmer, the bicyclist, broke all records for 34 to 42 miles. He rode the latter distance in 1 hour and 10 minutes, 39.5 seconds. He also broke the record for two hours, covering in that time 62 miles, 40 yards.

District option, however, which was earnestly contended for by the Pacific coast contingent before its secession, would be a practical force, allowing the territory in charge of each member of the national board to exercise local option by securing that consent of that official.

THE CHAINLESS WHEEL.

Toledo, O., Oct. 28.—The chainless bicycle question is going to develop one of the biggest fights, it is claimed, ever witnessed in the bicycle business. The fight, it is said, will be between the Columbia people, and nearly all of the other manufacturers who are coming out with '98 chainless wheel. There are a number of factories where chainless wheels will be manufactured, although none of them outside of Col. Pope appears to be anxious to place a chainless wheel on the market. Among those that may be mentioned outside of Pope and Leizer, are the Syracuse, Stearns, Western Wheel Works, Yost, Spalding and others. This combination recognizes the fact that Col. Pope has purchased the old league chainless patents, under which the original bevel-gear machines were manufactured, and first decided to test their validity and value. A syndicate was organized, a prominent western concern taking the initiative, and the other manufacturers were sounded upon the subject. A fund was immediately raised to make a thorough investigation. Expert patent attorneys were employed and nearly \$2,000 was expended in carefully investigating the premises. One of the manufacturers who assisted in raising the fund received a letter from the syndicate to the effect that the attorneys have reason to believe that the league patent or bevel-gearing patent will not hold.

SPOKES.

Cordiang earned \$4,000 for his 616-mile record, which is small compared to Michael's \$6,000 for 25 miles.

The alleged danger from bicycling is appendicitis. One of New York's yellow journals has discovered this.

There is an apparent tendency on the part of manufacturers to revert to the use of smaller balls in bearings next year. Brakes are also likely to be more sought for by riders and more freely offered by makers.

Three of England's greatest long distance riders, Messrs. Linton, Chase and Stocker, are of the opinion that moderate weight machines are the fastest.

Both Chase and Linton's latest racing machines turn the scales at over 26 pounds.

Nat Butler's performance of winning a mile handicap from scratch in 2:01 at Louisville last week, stamps him as a plunger of the first order. The figures lower the previous record, 2:04, held by Fred Titus, and are faster than any single paced ride.

The membership of the League of American Wheelmen is again hovering below the 100,000 mark, the withdrawal of the last few weeks having greatly exceeded the additions. The secretary's returns show the total league membership to be 97,767. New York State contributes 26,446 from these figures, while totals of other leading states are: Pennsylvania, 23,075; Massachusetts, 12,071; New Jersey, 6,724.

Fred Loughhead, the Canadian, who won the American one-mile national League of American Wheelmen championship, will take up his abode in New York for the winter, and ride in the Quill Club handicap, Charles Murphy, "Reddy" Goodman, Sam Brock, Frank White, Judge, Nagel, C. S. Henshaw, Oscar Headstrom, Hicks, Sibbey, Monte Palke, Egelhoff, Harrison, Jefferson, and "Wally" Owen have announced that they intend to keep up indoor riding.

FOOTBALL.

HIS NECK BROKEN.

New York, Oct. 28.—As the result of a football game Andrew Hasthe, 19 years old, is in a critical condition from a broken neck at the Astoria Hospital, in Long Island City. Doctors say that they have slight hopes of his recovery.

KICKS.

The Woodstock Football Club sent word Tuesday morning that they have withdrawn from the intermediate competition series. Aylmer therefore wins this game by default.

ONTARIO'S NORTHWEST.

Farmers in the Dryden District of Algoma Have Done Well.

Toronto, Oct. 28.—Mr. A. E. Annis, superintendent of the pioneer farm at Dryden, writing to the department of agriculture, reports that many applications have been made for lots in the addition to the town plot of Dryden, surveyed during the past summer. Three additional townships have also been surveyed, as all the land in the four old ones had already been taken up. An additional colonization road has been recently constructed, and quite a number of settlers have taken up lands made available by it. All the available lumber for building at Dryden has been used up, and it has been found necessary to bring in considerable quantities from Rat Portage.

Mr. Annis reports that all of the settlers who have taken hold of their properties in earnest have made good progress and are well pleased with their condition. The development of the town settlement and the demand for supplies from the adjoining mining camps has given the district a first-class market. Butter, for instance, has a summer weight not less than 20 cents a pound; eggs, from 18 to 25 cents a dozen; potatoes, 75 cents a bag, and beef, by the quarter, 8 1/2 cents per pound.

The mining boom seems to have come within a mile of Dryden, as a property known as the Munro-Hutchinson, has been lately sold to an English syndicate through Hon. Col. Aylmer.

Mr. Annis says that the grain has turned out very well this fall, and that potatoes yielded 400 bushels to the acre. The fall has been dry, making the pasture somewhat short, but the weather has been exceedingly favorable for clearing new land.

WOMAN LOST IN THE FOG.

Weldman, Mich., Oct. 28.—While out hunting for cows Mrs. Max Jeror became lost in the dense fog and wandered about for several hours. In the meantime a large number of people were out with lanterns, guns and horns looking for her.

LANSE, MICH., OCT. 28.—THE PROSPECTORS who are searching for gold in the Huron mountains are bringing in very handsome specimens of free mining gold quartz, assays having been made running well up into the hundreds.

EXPANSION OF TRADE.

Toronto, Oct. 28.—The bank clearings of Toronto for the month of October, less the last four days, show a considerable increase over the total of last October, amounting to \$2,044,929 for the present month, as against \$2,243,336 last October. The total for October, 1897, will run easily over \$34,000,000—an increase of \$5,000,000, indicating a considerable expansion of trade.

Sunday Schools.

Their Shortcomings and Great Opportunities

Discussed by the Huron Anglican Convention. By James Morgan's Able Paper—An Interesting Discussion Addressed by Judge McDonald and Hon. S. H. Blake, Q.C.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON.

Thursday afternoon the convention of Lay Workers and Sunday School Teachers of the Diocese of Huron considered the work of the Sunday school particularly. The Bishop of Huron presided, and an admirable address on "Sunday schools, their shortcomings and great opportunities," was delivered by Mr. James Morgan, M.A., of Barrie. A great deal of interest was aroused by the address, and a discussion, in which many took part, followed.

Before Mr. Morgan spoke, Sheriff Cameron was allowed to address the convention in the interests of the Children's Aid Society. He explained the purposes and methods of the society, and stated that the organization had power from the government to take children from the care of immoral or dissolute parents and place them in charge of foster parents. He asked that if any case of this kind in any part of the diocese came under the notice of the delegates they would notify the secretary of the society.

The bishop thanked Sheriff Cameron for his address. Mr. Morgan said he was present to give the results of a quarter century's work and failures in Sunday schools. One of the faults of Sunday schools was that they were allowed to take the place of the church, and another fault was that the work was done almost exclusively by ladies. The church stood aside and were content to do nothing. He held that men could talk to boys better than women could about the temptations peculiar to boys. It would be better to drop the Sunday evening service and help in the Sunday school than attend the two church services and do nothing at Sunday school work. Another fault was that teachers were not properly trained for their work, and had not the practical knowledge of what they had to teach. It was necessary in order to impart knowledge to others.

Canon Richardson opened the discussion. There were clergymen, he said, who regarded Sunday schools as useless, unprofitable, and damaging. This was to be deplored. The church itself believed in Sunday schools. Fifty years ago, he said, the public school of Ontario was a disgrace, but from the time of Dr. Ryerson they would have been a credit to any land. This improvement was brought about by getting better qualified teachers and being careful as to what was taught. These principles should be applied to the Sunday schools also, he said.

Mr. Jasper Golden, of Kingsville, said he had been a Sunday school worker for 66 years, and was the teacher of a Bible class. He found a liberal use of the blackboard a good thing.

Rev. F. E. Roy, of Wallaceburg, added some suggestions. Rev. T. Hill asked if the Leaflet should be given to Mr. Morgan. He replied that it should.

Archdeacon Davis asked Mr. Morgan's opinion of the new charter from the references in the New Testament. They were, Mr. Morgan said, the capital crime of all the crimes of the Sunday school. The result of reading the average Sunday school book was irreparable injury to the scholars. All books should be carefully examined before being used in the library.

Miss Osler, of Toronto, gave some excellent reasons for the use of the Leaflet.

Mr. A. Welch suggested a teacher class from which substitutes could be had when regular teachers were absent.

The bishop, in his closing remarks, said the convention owed a debt of gratitude to Mr. Morgan for his extremely able address. Regarding the proposition of some clergymen to the course of Sunday schools, he said there was no good that some did not oppose. Clergymen should be their laymen to come to the Sunday schools on the ground of confessing Christ. The bishop thoroughly sympathized with all that had been said about the difficulty of getting good teachers. So many people did not come into touch with the matter because they failed to realize that they had to stand on the level of the little ones to be understood by them. He trusted that the Sunday school would be greatly developed in the diocese.

IN THE EVENING.

After the opening of the evening meeting the bishop announced that this week the widow of a clergyman, lately deceased, had heard that owing to the deficiency of the mission fund, the clergy had their salaries reduced, and she wished to pay back the deficiency while drawing from the superannuation fund. She therefore gave to the mission fund \$2,000 in cash.

Judge McDonald, of Brockville, read a paper on "The call to service." The call was made, he said, by Jesus to his subject matter. "To ever man his work." These words were not to be taken in their widest significance, but must be governed by the words "ever man his work." It should not be supposed that anyone who would serve the Master must be perfect; neither should any person despair because of not having a feeling of being spiritual by mind. Feelings changed every hour, and one season the worker would be in the delectable mountains and at another in the dungeon of doubting. The means of grace, prayer, communion, and the nature of the service to be performed were all dealt with by the speaker. He warned people not to imitate a mere sentimental or emotional belief.

Hon. S. H. Blake, Q.C., spoke of "The Bible and the Bible class." His address was intensely interesting and frequently interrupted with applause. For a few moments before touching the subject of his address Mr. Blake spoke of "the call to service," as it was presented by Mr. D. L. Moody, of whom he spoke in terms of the highest praise and admiration. He had wished that every minister in the Dominion could be at a recent meeting conducted by Mr. Moody in Toronto. The Bible, said Mr. Blake, was a wonderful book, whether considered in its historical, literary, or scientific value. It was the book of authority. NEWFOUNDLAND GENERAL. St. Johns, Nfld., Oct. 28.—The general election of members of the Legislative Assembly took place yesterday. All of the 36 constituencies were contested. As large stretches of coast are comprised in some of the districts, the full results will not be known before next week. In the ruling House of Assembly the government has 22 seats, as against 14 held by the opposition.

ENGINEERS' UNION ENJOINED. New York, Oct. 28.—Justice Beach, in the supreme court, handed down a decision enjoining the United Portable Hoisting Engineers' Union and its walking delegate, Peter Gibbons, from interfering with Benjamin P. Davis, a non-union man, and also orders the defendant union to pay Davis \$500 damages for having kept him from working from June, 1895, to August, 1896.

usually everything that was material of the history of the Old Testament from the references in the New. The volumes were so closely interwoven that if the Old Testament were to fail, the New would fall with it. Speaking of the attacks made upon it he showed that many passages which were made much of by critics through misinterpretation, had been made clear by recent discoveries. If the critics of forty years ago had known what was known today they would be ashamed of what they had written. He gave many valuable suggestions as to methods of conducting the Bible class, and answered many objections that had been raised.

Mr. Charles Jenkins opened the discussion. He said when men like Judge McDonald and Hon. Mr. Blake, who were accustomed to weigh evidence, could come forward and bear such strong testimony to the truth of Scripture, it had great weight with him, and should have with all. Much had been said of the external evidences of Scripture. He added a few words with regard to the internal evidence. It appeared to the inner consciousness of men as no other book did or could.

The bishop, in closing, spoke of the satisfaction he felt in hearing two truths so forcibly set forth—the literal inspiration of the Bible, and the sacrificial death of Christ. Both papers had been very helpful.

It was announced that the meeting this evening would be open to all denominations.
