IN A SEA OF ICE.

Rough Sailing Between Newfoundland and Nova Scotia-Schooner Crushed-Lives Lost.

HALIFAX, N. S., March 27.-The steamer St. Pierre, from Newfoundland points, reports: The steamer St. Pierre arrived with the mails from the south coast of Newfoundland. The captain reports a rough and stormy passage. He found the gulf full of heavy ice, extending 50 miles east of Cape Ray on that coast, and 50 miles south of Cape Breton to latitude 45 deg. 32 m.r. north and longitude 59 deg. west. THE NICARAGUA TROUBLE.

Simple Solution of a Diplomatic Difficulty

That Threatned to Cause Bad Feeling Between John Bull and Uncle Sam.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 27 .- It is claimed by those who are in a position to be well informed as to the intentions of the British Foreign Office and also as to representations which our Government has made to Great Britain through Minister Bayard in regard to the British ultimatum to Nicaragua, that there is a misconception of the text of the document

The seven words in the untimatum to which President Cleverand and his Cabinet have attached so much importance, as, in a measure, sweeping away the cordial confidence which has marked all the recent diplomatic transactions of the United States with the British Foreign Office in regard to jurisdiction of the Mosquito strip were those which provided that the third member of the arbitration commission should be "not a citizen of any American republic." This phrase was thought to be an explicit declaration by England that she declined to recognize any force in the Monroe doctrine, and to be a gratuitous reflection upon the United States.

The intention to cast any reflection upon the United States was promptly disavowed by Lord Kimberley, through one of his under secretaries, and it is now stated that the meaning of the un-fortunate sentence used and the intentions of the British Government have been misconstrued.

As ordinarily employed and understood by the British Foreign Office, the phrase "American republic" is limited to the smaller republics of Central and South America. It was these republics that Great Britain desired to exclude from having the casting vote between the Nicaraguan Republic and the com-

missioner chosen by Great Britain.
As to the course which Great Britain will pursue to enforce a settlement of her claim for \$75,000 "smart money" for the affront put upon the British representative by his expulsion. well-informed diplomats are not disposed to think that any complications will arise. It is not for a moment believed that resort will be had to the extreme measure of threatening to bombard Greytown if Nicaragua should satisfactorily show her inability to settle her claim immediately. In that case the fime and method of payment may perhaps be submitted with the other claim to arbitration.


