London, Sept. 8.—The 29th annual Trades Union Congress, of Great Britain, opened yesterday at Edinburgh. About 360 delegates were in

attendance. The congress will close Saturday, Sept. 12. by ten feet, on the second floor of the building. Capt. Allan, Salvation Army, had been with him all night, and the latter engaged with the prisoner in prolonged prayer. The hanging apparatus consisted of a rope running over a pulley in the room above the death chamber. Two ends descended through holes in the floor, six feet apart. On one end a 500-pound weight of lead hung, six feet from the floor and a small line held the weight in suspension. The noose in the other

end of the rope was placed over Wheeler's neck. Wheeler said he was going to his doom. He said he murdered Annie Kempton at midnight, not in the eve-

ning as the crown had asserted. Wheeler's death was almost instantaneous, his neck being broken by the fall. The crowd outside the jail suspected that an early execution was intended, and were clamoring loudly for admittance at the time the pen-
