Early Thursday morning Davidson's old sawmill on the Allandale road, near the G. T. R. track, close to Harris, was totally destroyed by fire. Loss \$1,000.

George Laing, of Ridgeway, accused of breaking into the L. E. and D. R. R. depot at Blenheim, was committed for trial by the police magistrate. Bail was accepted for \$200.

Dr. Carson and Mr. Scott, of St. Thomas, took eighteen high-priced horses to Montreal. They found the horse market dull, however, and Mr. Scott, after selling three of the horses, took the remaining fifteen to New York.

A young lady named Clifford was found in an outhouse in the rear of her room in the Brunswick Hotel, Berlin, on Wednesday morning. She had retired without turning off the gas, and narrowly escaped with her life. She had come from St. Mary's to work.

George K. Morton, broker, is forming syndicates to develop the oil fields in the Bothwell oil region and vicinity. To Encourage Kindergarteners.

Labor of Love Engaged in by the Baroness Wendhausen.

She Comes From Germany to Promote the Froebel System—Will Visit Canada.

Detroit, May 14.—Quite a distinguished visitor witnessed the exercises of the kindergarten children in the Washington Normal School yesterday forenoon—Baroness von Buio Wendhausen. She is a German, and is greatly interested in the slow growth of the kindergarten in this city.

She made a short address in English to the little assembly of visitors and teachers, apologizing for its brevity by saying she had only three minutes to spare. She asked them to keep heart and persevere on the lines they are following. Brief addresses were also made by Miss Hopper, editor of the Kindergarten Magazine, of Chicago; School Inspector Lane and Superintendent Robinson.

To a reporter the baroness said: "My visit to this country is to carry to the Americans the dying message of my aunt, Baroness von Marenholtz Bulow. She asked me just before her death to convey to them her kindest wishes for their success in promoting Froebel's method, and offered a number of suggestions, which I have now in my hands of translators for publication in this country, for I think it is due the Americans to have it given to them first."

I go from here to Toronto and then to Boston and New York. I am giving lectures at my own expense, for the kindergarten is my life work, as it was that of my aunt and its originator, Froebel. I am very sorry, indeed, I cannot lecture here, as I can stay only a short time. The kindergarten is not thoroughly understood here or you would have it in all your schools. I have now in my school gentlemen, at least those I have had the pleasure to meet, appreciate the method very heartily, but you—what do you call them—taxpayers. Yes; your taxpayers are afraid of the expense. Ah, if they only knew! They cannot see that it is a small expense for the little ones, who will be men and women so soon.

The baroness is a woman of perhaps 40 years of age. There is a kindliness about her that charms one before she has spoken. She gives one the impression that she is a woman of the hand that expresses her amiability. She is quite slender and well dressed, entirely in white cloth and a dainty little French creation surmounted her abundance of golden brown hair.

FRUIT PROSPECTS.

Glowing Accounts From the Niagara Peninsula.

Toronto, May 14.—Mr. W. H. Orr, of Fruitland, director of fruit spraying for the province of Ontario, who has just come from a trip through the Niagara peninsula, gives a most glowing account of the prospects for fruit in that district. Such fruits as apples, pears, plums, etc., are now in full blossom, and simply loaded with it, and the fruit is of a fine quality. In a few days there will no doubt be an abundant crop. The early peach crop is not so good, but the results will be looked for with great interest.

A HEART AS EVIDENCE

It Was the Property of a Rich Oil Operator—Interesting Insurance Suit.

Pittsburg, Pa., May 14.—A human heart, which was found in a hole in the counsel table to be used as evidence in a trial in the United States Circuit Court here, was the property of Mr. Louis Morris, wife of Louis Morris, the wealthy oil operator, who died at Lake Chautauque in 1894. Mr. Morris had his life insured for \$200,000. Ten thousand dollars of this was for accident insurance in the Fidelity and Casualty Company of New York. It refused to pay the policy, as a post-mortem examination showed that Mr. Morris had a hole in his heart.

The insurance people will try to prove that Morris committed suicide, and was a very successful lawyer. Later he did business as a conveyancer and insurance agent, but in the end he became a destitute and was asked to be committed, and said there was nothing for him but the jail or the river.

The circumstances surrounding Morris' death make the case most complicated. The oil man weighed 300 pounds, and while rowing at Mayville, N. Y., in Lake Chautauque, in March, 1894, he was seen to rise up and topple into the lake. He was dragged out and the insurance people claim that he was dead when pulled out. The physicians said death by drowning. The insurance people claim suicide. The Mayville rescuers claim he was not dead, but bled profusely after being taken from the water. Dr. Isham, of Chicago, was called on, and he removed the heart, finding in it a hole through which a pencil could be pushed—a rare case. Dr. Isham claims it is the third adult case on record—two other similar hearts being in the New York Medical Museum. Dr. Isham preserved the heart in alcohol.

THE STRANGLER.

New York Police Think They Have Got Him—Identified by a Victim's Companion.

New York, May 14.—In the person of a peddler named Joseph Talker, or Talt, the police think they have found the stranger who caused the death of several women of the town within the last year. Talker was arrested at the instance of Mrs. Furline Earnst, who recognized him as the man who attacked her in Central Park a few weeks ago and robbed her of her jewelry.

Talker confessed he was the robber, Joseph Freeman, who was the mate of Annie Book, mysteriously strangled to death in her apartments near Fourteenth street last year, identified Talker as being a man who was with the Book woman shortly before the latter's death.

The detective bureau also connect Talker with the more recent death by strangling of Minnie Weidt and "Diamond Flossie" Murphy.

TREND OF TRADE.

Dun & Co.'s report says: At Toronto the outlook is generally considered as hopeful, and increased activity is looked for. Spring seeding is well advanced, and the winter wheat is said to be looking well. Prices of the leading staples of merchandise are unchanged as a rule, and payments are not as good as they should be, although in some instances they are reported as satisfactory.
