STUDENTS IN TOWN.

Seven or Eight Hundred Lunch at the G. T. R. Station.

And Are Joined By a London Delegation-They Go to Attend the Great Detroit Convention.

London had seven or eight hundred students for lunch and dinner to-day. Like other wise men they came from the east and while they left their college yells at home with their books they brought with them a rich profusion and variety of college colors.
