Chicago, Feb. 13.—"England nct only will have to come to the terms of peace insisted on by the Boers, but will be forced to pay to Transvaal fighters from \$40,000,000 to \$50,000,000 indemnity," said Jan Krige, the Boer commandant under Gen. Botha, who is in Chicago. "The cables say that Dewet has crossed the Orange River with a force of 2,000 men. If this is true, it is the death-blow to England's hope of subduing the Boers, because Dewet certainly will have a force of 50,000 in the colony, and can dictate terms. The Boers have no reason in the world to surrender now."

WIRELESS MESSAGES.

Queen Sophia

London, Feb. 13.-Prof. John A Fleming, lecturing at Liverpool, said he had Signor Marconi's permission to make the first mention of the fact that on the first day of the reign of King Edward VII. he (Marconi) accomplished the astonishing fact of sending wireless messages between St. Catharines, Isle of Wight, and the Lizzard, 200 miles. Perfect communication between the two points has since been established.

RAVAGES OF THE PLAGUE. The London Daily Mail publishes the following from its St. Petersburg correspondent: "Serious reports are correspondent: "Serious reports are in circulation here regarding the out-break of what was first called 'hunger typhus,' but is now officially admitted to be bubonic plague, in the Khirghiz steppes of Western Siberia. Many thousands have died in the districts between Semipalantinsk and Oren burg. BURGLARS AT WORK IN CITY!

Blew Open a Safe With Gun Powder.

Three Places Entered and Articles Stolen.

One of the Marauders Shot by P. C. Downs.

Another Captured by P. C. Eilson

After a Hard Chase. Man in Custody Claims to Hail From Toronto-Haul Made by Burg-

lars Was Light.

London has for many months enjoyed the good fortune of escaping the attentions of the professional cracksman and the midnight burglar, but early morning events today indicate a temporary cessation of this immunity. A record of the occurrences, which caused considerable activity in police circles between 2 and 5 o'clock this morning, include the entry of a Richmond street bicycle and gun shop, and an East End blacksmith shop, the burglarizing of a Hamilton road store, and the blowing open of the safe therein, some clever detective reasoning on the part of P. C. Harry Down, his pursuit of two of the three suposed depredators, the wounding and possible death

of one, and the chase and capture of another by P. C. Gilson. The first act in the nocturnal drama opened some time after midnight, when the shop of D. McKenzie & Co., bicycle repairers and gunsmiths, at 289 Richmond street, below the G. T. R. tracks, was entered by unknown men. Entry was secured by sawing of a hole in the back door. Here the burglars secured 150 knives, 3 revolvers and a number of tools, including a pair of wire pinchers and a screwdriver. Coppers to the value of 60 cents

were also taken.

The approach of 3 o'clock found the midnight marauders on the Hamilton road, near Dreaney avenue, the first street east of Adelaide street. the blacksmith shop of Wm. E. Rice was broken into, and a small sledge, a large circular spike, a brace and a drill secured. Armed with implements an entry was speedily affected to the general store of Chas. Depper, at 235-239 Hamilton road. The building is a two-story frame structure, the eastern part of the lower flat being occupied by the store and the western part and upper floor of the building forming the family residence. After entering the store intruders evidently concluded they needed a change of clothing, for upon the man arrested later in the morning was found three suits of underwear, a shirt and a pair of socks, all taken from the stock of the store. An overcoat was also stolen from the stock and thrown away by one of the men in their flight from the police. A curious feature of the affair is the (Continued on Page 6.)
