At the inaugural meeting of the hospital trust, which was held yesterday afternoon, the new members of the trust, Messrs. Waterman and McLeod, assumed the duties of their office, and upon the unanimous choice of the trustees the chairmanship was again given to the esteemed chairman of last year—Mr. Thomas McCormick, who, being ill, was unable to be present at the meeting. In his absence, Mr. Waterman was voted to the chair. Only routine business was transacted by the trust, and subsequently the superintendent escorted the members through the hospital.

Superintendent Balfour reported having admitted since Dec. 27, 53 patients and the number of those discharged was 46, leaving 51 patients under treatment.

DISASTROUS EXPLOSION

Three Men Killed by Collapse of a Boiler.

Sudden Death of a Well-Known St. Thomas Citizen.

Suicide of a Man Ninety Years of Age—A Number of Other Casualties.

Huntington, W. Va., Jan. 11.—A boiler exploded at the lumber mills of Lewis Midkiff, in the southern part of this county yesterday, killing three persons and injuring several others. The dead are: Lewis Midkiff, Burt Trippett, Benjamin Messinger.

FELL UNDER AN ENGINE.
Utica, N. Y., Jan. 11.—Charles Peck, a carpenter employed on the Mohawk and Malone Railroad, was instantly killed yesterday at Tupper Lake by falling under an engine.

STRUCK BY A LOCOMOTIVE.
Schenectady, N. Y., Jan. 11.—Olin Vaughan, of Utica, Mass., boss mason of the Boston and Maine Railroad, was struck by a switch engine near here yesterday and instantly killed.

DROPPED DEAD.
St. Thomas, Jan. 11.—Thomas Ward, foreman of the Michigan Central Railroad shops and one of the oldest and best known residents of this city, dropped dead suddenly last evening. Mr. Ward had just returned from work and was sitting on a lounge reading his newspaper, when he fell back and expired without the slightest warning. He was in his 67th year. Robert D. Ensle, the well-known National League baseball umpire, is a son-in-law of deceased.

STUCK A FORK IN HER EYE.
St. Thomas, Jan. 11.—A daughter of Thomas Hill was playing with her little brother on Thursday, who held a fork in his hand. One of the prongs entered the right eye of the little girl, inflicting a dangerous wound.

SUICIDE AT 90.
New York, Jan. 11.—Christopher Miller, 90 years old, hanged himself in the bathroom of his son's home yesterday. A week ago the old man was much grieved by the death of his sister-in-law at the age of 80 years, and his mind was very feeble. He was up by reading of the accident in the New York Central tunnel on Wednesday.

KILLED BY A RUNAWAY.
Minneapolis, Minn., Jan. 11.—William Ritchie, a farmer, was killed in a runaway accident Thursday. He leaves a widow and several children.

FELL FROM A LADDER.
Schenectady, N. Y., Jan. 11.—Ersikine Tels, a painter, of this city, fell from a ladder in a house in which he was working yesterday, and was instantly killed. He fell from the garret to the cellar striking on his head, and fracturing his skull.

SAVED FROM SUICIDE.
Kingston, Ont., Jan. 11.—Corp. Abba, A. Battery, while in a melancholy condition from a drinking bout, tried to commit suicide in the guard house. He was discovered and saved by one of the Duke of Cornwall's regimentals during his Canadian tour.

DEEPLY BURIED.
Negaunee, Mich., Jan. 11.—Three acres of ground have been sunk at the Negaunee mine as a result of the cave-in which took the lives of nine miners. The bodies of the eight men still buried in the earth and water, 100 feet below the surface, never will be recovered. The great hole of earth above the mine is funnel-shaped. Those who have the hardihood to stand at the brink can see water pouring in from different directions, bearing down into the abyss sand and earth debris. In the shaft operations are still going on. Every device known to mining methods is being tried in the effort to reach the bodies of the nine miners.

The mine is perilous, and only the strongest and bravest of the miners are employed.

The Girls of Holland.

[London Humanitarian.]

In Holland the mass of every class go to public schools and all mix together. Education begins at the age of five in the public schools, and at 12 a girl is examined and passes on for a five years' course in the higher burgher schools, of which Holland possesses 72. The education of the sexes is an admitted principle. In the primary schools boys and girls are brought up together. My lesson side by side and are on familiar terms from earliest childhood, without the smallest ill result. A great point is made of languages, and no Dutch girl of the middle classes is considered educated who cannot speak English, French and German more or less fluently.

Probably owing to the system of education in force, the women folk are inclined to grow up somewhat independent; we are told that the prejudice against women working for a livelihood has almost disappeared, and even rich women sometimes choose a profession. They include doctors, dentists, many of the first rate photographers and gardeners. About 1,000 girls hold posts as assistant chemists, some 3,000 are nurses, trained in the White Cross homes, and on a par with the very best of their profession. A woman is curator of the National Museum in Haarlem, and another holds the same post at Utrecht, while a third is head dispenser at a hospital in Amsterdam. The railway, post and telegraph offices are largely served by female clerks, who altogether outnumber the male.

Girls in Holland have a great deal of liberty. They pay calls, shop and do to parties at the houses of friends without a chaperon walk and travel alone, cycle and have tennis and wheeling clubs in company with young men. They enjoy their fun and freedom, and are in no hurry to find husbands. Marriages are not arranged, and the parents' consent is only asked after a proposal is made and accepted.

GOT NO PASSE.

Chicago, Jan. 9.—Officers of the big lake steamship lines have protested against the anti-pass rule put into effect Jan. 1 by the Government. Though 25 of these representatives were expected at the meeting of the Central Passenger Association today, not one appeared, and they sent word that they did not come because they could not afford to pay their fares.
