OAK HALL**MR. SUTHERLAND'S ESTATE**Late Minister Left Large Fortune
—How Disposed Of.Woodstock, Ont., May 15.—Rumors
during the past few days concerning
the estate of the late Hon. James
Sutherland placed its value at from
\$800,000 to \$2,000,000, and until today
no definite information could be secured.Hon. Mr. Sutherland never married,
and practically the whole of his for-
tune falls to his only surviving sister,
Mrs. J. A. McKenzie, her children and
another niece and nephew. The divi-
sion is made as follows:Mrs. J. A. McKenzie, \$150 per month
for life, and at her death each of her
seven children to receive \$5,000.J. A. McKenzie, brother-in-law, is to
receive the income on \$10,000 for life,
and after death the principal is to be
divided among his seven children.A number of small bequests are
made aggregating \$5,000, divided be-
tween Mr. J. B. Hunter, of Ottawa,
private secretary to Mr. Sutherland;
his nurse and those of his servants
who had been in his employ some time.The general hospital will receive \$20,-
000, and the directors are to keep the
money invested and apply the income**NEW C. P. R. LINES**Big Road Will Be Active in Ontario
This Summer.Toronto, May 15.—The Canadian Pa-
cific Railroad Company will be un-
usually active in Ontario this summer.Next week tenders for the construc-
tion of the Sudbury-Toronto line from
the Magnetawan River to Toronto will
be opened. The sixty miles from the
Magnetawan to Sudbury has just been
completed.Survey parties have just completed
work on a line from Flessborough to
Walkerton and construction will com-
mence almost right away. This line
will go by way of Flessborough, Durham,
and Hanover, to Walkerton.In two weeks' time surveying parties
will be sent out to lay out a new line
from Victoria Harbor across the north
of Lake Couchiching to Shabro Lake.This is the C. P. R.'s new grain route,
from the west to the seaboard. Big
elevators will be erected at Victoria
Harbor, and the grain steamers will
unload there and trans-ship for rail
transportation direct to Montreal.The water journey from the head
of Lake Superior to Victoria Harbor is a
trifle less than from the same point
to Owen Sound, and the new route
will cut off 150 miles of haulage, an
immense saving in time, to say noth-
ing of the elimination of the inconve-
nience of bringing the grain south to
Toronto, and handling it over the con-
gested Ontario and Quebec divisions.The new line, too, opens up back
townships that are rich in timber and
minerals.**WINNIPEG THE WICKED**"Ralph Connor" Repeats Sensational
Charges Against Society.Winnipeg, May 15.—Rev. C. W. Gor-
don preached his second sermon on the
"Peril of Our City," last evening in
St. Stephen's Church, Winnipeg. He
did not consider Winnipeg as a sinner
above all others, but rather thought
this city morally and intellectually
the equal of any he had known. Not
in any other Canadian city was there
reverence for sacred things, for the
sacred day, for the sacred church of
God found in greater degree than here
in Winnipeg.But Winnipeg has great perils. The
experience of the past week, informa-
tion that had come to him by letterand by word, unsought, had been much
as to make a man sick at heart—not
indignant, but sick. There was no
place for anger or indignation. His
mind was filled with sorrows and
shame. He wondered if the people of
Winnipeg, respectable people, had any
idea of the extent to which this state
of things had honey-combed society.**EVA BOOTH COLLAPSED**Noted S. A. Leader Obligated to Canc-
Address at Chicago.Chicago, May 15.—Miss Eva Booth,
commander of the Salvation Army,
collapsed last night at Orchestral Hall
as she was about to deliver an ad-
dress, and was unable to fill her en-
gagement. She had had an abscess
beneath her tongue removed Saturday.
Although suffering considerable pain,
Miss Booth addressed the large audi-
ence in Orchestral Hall yesterday af-
ternoon, but in the evening she broke
down in one of the retiring rooms be-
fore she had an opportunity even to
appear on the platform.While the illness is painful, it is not
believed serious, and it is thought Miss
Booth will be able to leave Chicago to-
night for the continuation of her west-
ern trip.Miss Booth gave her address in the
afternoon in full, but the strain was
too much for her. When she reached
Orchestra Hall from the Wellington
Hotel, where she is stopping, in the
evening, and went into one of the pri-
vate rooms she collapsed almost at
once. Dr. P. W. White, the attending phy-
sician of the Wellington, who was in a
box, was called, and under his direc-
tions Miss Booth was placed in a cab.
It was found that the abscess broke
into the hotel. Subsequently it was
declared that she was not seriously ill.**SEVERAL CLAIMS FOR DAMAGES**

PRESENTED TO CITY COUNCIL

Accidents the Cause of Three of
Them—Street Name To
Be Changed.Move May Be Made to Secure
Better Banking Rates
for the City.The city council last night practi-
cally decided to change the name of South
street to Ottawa street. The matter
was, however, moved to No. 2 com-
mittee, and that body will report as to
the cost of the proposed change, as
well as the effect on the other streets
whose names require changing now.A largely signed petition was pre-
sented yesterday that the name of the
street be changed to Ottawa, a mark of
respect to Miss Beck, wife of Hon.
Adam Beck, whose maiden name was
Miss Lillian Ottawa.Ald. Matthews, in the course of the
discussion stated that he believed the
prayer of the petition should be granted,
and he moved that the street be
named Ottawa.It was pointed out that the names of
several other streets should also be
changed, and these streets will be re-
ported on by No. 2.**Claims for Damages.**Mr. R. K. Cowan, on behalf of Robert
Brooks, butcher, of London town-
ship, notified the city that unless sat-
isfactory amends were made to his
client, he will sue for damages, sus-
tained by him through a defective
street. Referred to the solicitor and
No. 2.W. J. Reid notified the council that
the weight of the earth on the break-
water is breaking up the entrance to the
baseball park, and he demands that a
new fence be constructed at once, or
he will be compelled to look to the city
for damages. The communication was
sent to No. 2 committee.Mr. R. M. C. Toole wrote that his
eldest son, Peter Mitchell, of 411 Prince
cess avenue, sustained serious injuries
owing to the condition of the intersec-
tion of Queen's avenue and Colborne
street, and he asked for compensation
for her. The claim was referred to
No. 2.Still another claim was presented by
Stuart & Gunn, on behalf of Miss Ross,
who caught her foot in a hole at the
corner of Richmond and King streets,
and injured her leg. No. 2 will deal
with this claim also.The following local improvement peti-
tions were received: For a cement
walk on north St. James street, Alma
to Wellington; for a cement walk on
east Mainland street, South to Nelson
street; for an addition to the cement
walk on both sides of King street,
Ridout to Talbot; for a cement walk
on north Grosvenor street, Richmond
to George; for the grading of Ken-
neth avenue; against a cement curb
on St. James street, Colborne to Wil-
lam; against a sidewalk on east Gibe-
lert between King and Dundas. All were
referred to the assessment commis-
sioner.**Will Sell the Land.**By a vote of 7 to 6 the council de-
cided to sell the strip of land between
St. James and St. George streets, be-
tween Oxford and St. James, to Alex.
Harvey, for \$32, the value the
assessment commissioner placed on it.It took the council a long time to ar-
rive at the decision, and a rider was
added to the effect that Mr. Harvey, in
order to secure the deed, must build
on the property before Dec. 31, 1906.Ald. Matthews vigorously opposed the
