Theodore Zeates Made Police Chief of Winnipeg Force.

CALEB P. SIMPSON HAS PASSED AWAY

Well-Known Lawyer of London Died in Minneapolis.

The death occurred at his home in Minneapolis on Saturday last of Caleb Platt Simpson, formerly a well-known resident of this city. Mr. Simpson was 50 years old, a barrister, and at one time was master in chambers at the Ontario Court. He was born in London, where he practiced law for some years. He then retired and became a teacher of shorthand in the London Business College, in which he and Mr. W. N. Yerex were partners. About five years ago Mr. Simpson moved to Minneapolis. Besides his wife, he is survived by two sons and one daughter. Messrs. Frank and Fred Simpson, wholesale jewelers in Minneapolis, and Miss Minnie, also of that city. While living in London Mr. Simpson was a member of the Colborne Street Methodist Church. Mr. and Mrs. R. R. Goulding, of 238 King street, are relatives. The remains will be brought to this city for interment, but the arrangements have not yet been completed. The late Mr. Simpson had many friends in London, who will be pained to hear of his death. He was a member of the old school, with the art of winning confidence, and in his capacity of teacher in the business university, he formed many pleasant times with the younger generation of Londoners.

GIVE LARGE SUMS TO MCGILL UNIVERSITY

Gifts of \$100,000 and \$25,000 From Unknown Persons.

Montreal, Feb. 10.—An anonymous donor today gave \$100,000 to McGill University on condition that an additional \$500,000 be raised, the resultant \$600,000 to be funded for the general use of the university. No time limit is set for the collection of the half million, but Principal Peterson today stated that he already had in hand about \$100,000 to this fund, including a donation of \$50,000 recently made by Mr. Robert Reford, and another gift of \$25,000, which was made today, also by an anonymous benefactor.

IN STORM'S GRIP

Montreal Traffic Being Tied Up by Snow.

Montreal, Feb. 10.—Montreal is today in the grip of a heavy snowstorm that promises to tie up the street and steam railways very severely. The storm started early this morning.

Slush Froze on Rails. Kingston, Feb. 10.—The street railway service is at a standstill, owing to the slushstorm. The company got its cars out early, and were able to keep going until 8 o'clock. The slush and sleet froze over the rails, and traffic had to be suspended. The ice will have to be cut off, and men are busily engaged to prevent a more serious freeze-up.

VOID AFTER 15 DAYS FROM DATE.

C. P. R.'S OFFER FOR RUNNING RIGHTS

Will Pay \$135,000 Annually To Run Over I. C. R. Rails.

Ottawa, Feb. 10.—The Minister of Railways gave the House a history of the negotiations between the C. P. R. and Government in connection with their running rights over the I. C. R. between St. John and Halifax, as initiated by Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, president of the C. P. R. In 1907, it was pointed out that since June 5, 1907, when the Government's terms were made known to the company, no further action was taken.

Shaughnessy's First Letter. In President Shaughnessy's first letter to the then Minister of Railways, Hon. Mr. Emmerson, on Jan. 19, 1907, the former pointed out that the Canadian Pacific was desirous of getting connection with the I. C. R. and he believed that the Intercolonial tracks were sufficient to accommodate the traffic of both companies. He suggested a division of expenses and revenues on the ordinary wheeled basis, and proposed a rental of \$135,000 per annum for an agreement extending over a period of fifty years.

A memorandum prepared for the minister showed the estimated value of the main line from St. John to Halifax and of that part of the terminals which would be jointly used to be \$20,413,529.

Meeting Held. At a meeting held in Montreal, June 5, 1907, between Messrs. Butler and Tiffin, to discuss the matter, Mr. Butler demanded on behalf of the I. C. R. that the granting of running rights should not involve any loss in revenue to the Intercolonial; that the Canadian Pacific pay interest at say 2 per cent on the value of the property to be used; that in appraising the expenses of maintenance the Canadian Pacific should agree to pay a rate per train mile that would cover the cost of maintenance; that the company must agree to take over at the same rate of pay and standing, any trainmen dropped by the Intercolonial due to such reduction of train service as might be forced on the Intercolonial, owing to the Canadian Pacific replacing its own trains; that on station to station traffic the Canadian Pacific should pay to the Intercolonial say 15 per cent of the gross receipts for the first five years. The conference concluded without any understanding being reached.

Mr. Graham's Suggestion. Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, president of the C. P. R., wrote Hon. Mr. Graham on July 14, 1908, suggesting a renewal of the negotiations. He noted that the Canadian Pacific wished to participate in local as well as through traffic, and he regarded as reasonable a rental consisting of 3 1/2 per cent interest on half the reasonable value of the railway and terminals. He again suggested a rental of \$135,000 per annum.

On Nov. 21 last, Sir Thomas again wrote to Mr. Graham, stating that up to the present the progress had been made because of the differences between the Government and the company, as to what would be a fair basis of compensation. He suggested that the whole matter be referred to a board, consisting of one representative of each railway, to make a joint recommendation as to a fair basis of agreement. This recommendation, he adds, shall not be considered as binding on either party.

NOT FOR DOWNEY. Toronto, Feb. 10.—Sir James Whitney when asked concerning the likelihood of Mr. J. P. Downey being prevailed upon to accept the position of agent-general for Ontario in England, shook his head.

"No," he observed, "I desire to correct the impression which has gone abroad with reference to the colonization projects of the Government. The question of filling Mr. Southworth's position has not been discussed by the cabinet and no rumor in relation to it has any foundation. Mr. Downey, M. P., has not been mentioned or spoken of for the place, and naturally feels aggrieved that he has been put in such a position without any suggestion or desire on his part."

In the offertory box of a parish church in Liverpool on Sunday there was a paper packet containing two half-crowns. On the paper was written "My first week's pension, and thank God for it." The incident was related by the Bishop of Liverpool. It is also stated that a sale of work organized by the Primitive Methodists at Dukinfield, Mrs. Sanderson, an aged Sunday school worker, subscribed five shillings, the first sum she received under the new act.

EVEN BUDDHA LOSES PATIENCE

Influential Jap Journal Intimates That American 'Insults Have Gone Too Far.'

Tokio, Feb. 10.—The Japanese newspapers continue to be filled with dispatches emanating from San Francisco, New York and London, indicating a serious increase in anti-Japanese sentiment in the Pacific Coast states, which is said to be rapidly spreading to interior states. The Asahi's San Francisco correspondent has cabled to the paper alleged statements and utterances of senators and others which are of most sensational character. The dispatches state that all Pacific states are developing grave opposition to the Japanese residents, and urging legislative measures which would deprive such residents of all rights which enable them to reside and transact business in these states.

These dispatches are being widely read throughout Japan, and are creating a deep impression. The Undispatch, which is independent politically, editorially comments the dispatch, however, urging the Japanese to patience and a reliance upon the better elements among the Americans for a protection of their rights.

The Hochi, which is of the sensationalist press, makes heated and passionate comments on the American dispatches, and concludes with the Japanese proverb "Even Buddha loses patience if his face is slapped thrice."

London dispatches also depict the anti-Japanese situation in America as grave.

The attitude of the Government officials and of the better classes who absolutely control Japan, remains unchanged. Americans everywhere are assured that Japan has no reason to believe that the action of the state legislatures will in any way affect the relations between the two nations.

He can, however, legally call upon B to erect and maintain half the line fence between their lots, which will include the space occupied by the stable. A can cut down all trees on his lot on the line between it and the lot of B without interfering with his wife's fence. B cannot legally remove the wire fence, nor can A.

If you want to build a new fence between you and C, and the latter will not agree to your doing so, you can give him notice that you will do so at the expiry of six months, and can then legally do so without his consent. If the present fence is defective you can at once call in the fence-viewers and have an award to have it repaired at the joint expense of you and C.

The owner of hens must keep them on his own premises and is liable for damages to the gardens of his neighbors in a suit in the division court. He may also be fined if there is a local bylaw in force against hens running at large.
