Preachers Condemned Sunday Cars

Subject in Many Pulpits on Sunday

Trolleys on Sabbath a Convenience, 'Twas Said—Not a Necessity.

There was hardly a preacher in the city yesterday who did not touch upon the subject of Sunday street cars, and although the majority did not devote any large amount of time to the subject their remarks were in the nature of condemnation, on the ground that the cars were not needed.

The Auditorium was crowded to the doors Sunday afternoon to hear Rev. J. G. Shearer, of Toronto, secretary of the Social and Moral Reform Society, and Rev. T. A. Moore, secretary of the Lord's Day Alliance.

Mr. Shearer, who spoke first, maintained that Sunday cars in any city were a mere convenience and not a necessity. In a place the size of London there was absolutely no need for them, as only a very few persons would use them. The street railway people did not want them, although he was afraid it was because they did not think that at present the scheme would pay.

Street railway directors were just the same as any other directors, and the moment they found there was a prospect of increasing their dividends by Sunday cars, just so soon would they change and be in favor of them.

Just a Beginning.

It was to be regretted that a number of workmen were working against their own cause by favoring Sunday cars and other things that would cause some one to have to work on the Sabbath.

The people who now want Sunday cars would soon want the cigar stores to be open on Sunday, and then they would want the theaters open, and one thing would lead to another until the country would become degenerate.

People said the Lord's Day Alliance were narrow, but they were simply trying to live up to the golden rule of the organization, not to want anything done on the Sabbath that would deprive some other person or persons of their day of rest.

Secretary Moore.

Provincial Secretary Moore spoke briefly eulogizing the work of Mr. Shearer at Ottawa, in securing the passing of the Lord's Day Act.

Mr. Moore spoke of the improved conditions in France since the passing of the Lord's Day Act there a short time ago.

Mr. Moore dealt with the struggle of the church in this country, in the Sabbath, and stated that they had at last been successful. No one should oppose any measure that tended to
