MONTEITH AS AGENT GENERAL

Rumored that He Will Be Appointed Head of Colonization Bureau.

Toronto, Aug. 10.—"Immediately upon my return from England I expect to be able to make a definite announcement in reference to the portfolio of agriculture," said Sir James Whitney, the provincial prime minister, in an interview with *The News* this morning.

Unofficial rumor connects the name of Hon. Nelson Monteth, minister of agriculture, with the Government appointment of agent general for Ontario to be created in connection with the opening of a fully-equipped provincial colonization bureau in London, England.

The plan for the establishment of this bureau was evolved by the minister, who will follow the premier to London within the next two weeks for the purpose of completing the arrangements. Ontario's new offices are likely to be located in the heart of the metropolis. It is possible that the C. P. R.'s premises on the Strand may be leased.

An aim will be made to secure for Northern Ontario the best class of British immigrants as permanent settlers, and the whole system governing immigration will be reorganized.

Monteth as Agent General.
Upon this work Hon. Mr. Monteth has been engaged for some time in conjunction with Hon. Mr. Cochrane, the minister of lands and mines, and it is probable that upon its completion, if he still adheres to his decision to retire from the cabinet, the Government will ask the present minister of agriculture to accept the position of Ontario's chief representative in London.

It is said, however, that the prime minister would welcome Mr. Monteth's decision to remain in the cabinet.

Educational Questions.
Educational problems will also engross the attention of Sir James Whitney in England. With Hon. Dr. Payne he will also make a study of conditions relative to the conduct of government of public institutions for the blind and deaf and dumb. It has been already intimated that next Legislature session will see radical reforms along these lines inaugurated.

During the absence of Sir James, Hon. J. J. Foy, the attorney-general, has been appointed acting prime minister.

RUN RACE WITH DEATH AND LOSE

Two Boys Are Caught in Middle of Railroad Bridge.

Indianapolis, Ind., Aug. 10.—More than a score of men and women stood on the banks of White River, seven miles from Indianapolis, this afternoon, and watched Herbert Staley, 17 years old, and John Weston, 19, run a frantic race with death for 200 feet across the Monon Railroad bridge. The race was a losing one, for the young men before they had reached the end of the structure were hurled to death by a passenger train.

A companion of the boys, Herbert Jenkins, 18 years old, reached the end of the bridge a few seconds ahead of the speeding train. Jenkins hurled himself down the grade, and, climbing back up the embankment, saw the fate of his companions.

Young Staley was carried 200 feet along the right of way, while Weston's body was thrown down the embankment.
