BRANDENBURG FREED ON LARENCY CHARGE

Immediately Arrested on Charge of Kidnapping Cabana Boy.

New York, June 29. — Broughton Brandenburg, who has been on trial in the criminal branch of the supreme court on a charge of obtaining \$500 on false pretences from the New York Times, through the sale of an article purporting to have been written by the late Grover Cleveland, was acquitted this afternoon. The jury stood ten to two for acquittal from the first.

As soon as Brandenburg left the courtroom he was rearrested on an indictment found against him in St. Louis charging him with kidnapping his stepson, Bass Cabana III. He was remanded to the Tombs for a hearing Tuesday. His lawyers, it is believed, intend to fight extradition.

HOTELMEN ORDERED TO PROVIDE ESCAPES

Toronto, June 30. — The license board of the Provincial Secretary's department has sent out to all license inspectors in the Province copies of the new regulations respecting the provision of fire escapes on hotels. In all hotels more than one story in height ropes at least must be provided to serve as fire escapes.

PRESENTATION MADE A POPULAR OFFICER

Police Force, of London, Gave Handsome Suitcase to Harry Greene.

Patrol Sgt. Harry Greene, who has been appointed chief of police of St. Catharines, and leaves this morning to assume his duties, was presented by Chief Williams on behalf of the force last night with a handsome umbrella and suitcase. The presentation was made in the presence of a number of the officers of the police station last night, and the chief spoke of the general regret that he and every member of the force felt in losing Sgt. Greene.

All, however, he said, would join with him in wishing the new chief every success in St. Catharines.

Sgt. Greene, in reply, thanked the chief and members of the force for their great kindness to him, and spoke of the pleasant relations which had always existed between them. He said he would always have a warm spot in his heart for London, and hoped to visit here often.

THIRTEEN-YEAR-OLD GIRL WAS BADLY BURNED

Accident to Agnes Greene While Lighting a Stove Yesterday Morning.

Agnes Greene, the 13-year-old daughter of ex-Sgt. Harry Greene, had a narrow escape from being seriously injured yesterday morning at her home, 835 Colborne street. She was about to light the gas stove, when the match she had struck, went out. Leaving the gas turned on Miss Greene went to get another match. As soon as she struck it there was an explosion, which burned off her eyebrows, and eyelashes, set fire to her hair, and scorched her face. Mrs. Greene happened to be close at hand, and immediately smothered the fire in the girl's hair. It was feared at first that her eyesight might have been injured, but beyond the burns it is not thought that she was seriously hurt.

A DEMONSTRATION FOR EDITOR FOURNIER

Montreal, June 29. — Editor Jules Fournier, who was recently sent to Quebec jail for three months for criticizing the administration of judges in this province, and who has been released on a writ of habeas corpus, will be tendered a demonstration tomorrow night here.

Fournier arrives at the G. T. R. station at 7:20 p.m., and will be met by a body of sympathizers, who will escort him to St. James' market, where a mass meeting is to be held. There is every indication of some stirring times, as Henri Bourassa, the Nationalist leader, will be among those to speak in denunciation of Fournier's sentence.

THE SUFFRAGETTES AGAIN DESIEGE THE BRITISH COMMONS

'Hoodooed' by Thirteenth Attempt to Raid Parliament, They Are Again Defeated After Desperate Struggle With Police, and Many Arrests Follow.

London, June 29. — The thirteenth vain attempt of the militant suffragettes to obtain access to Premier Asquith by deputation resulted in exciting scenes in parliament square to night and the arrest of more than 100 women. The plan of campaign followed the lines previously employed by the suffragettes. The "woman's parliament" assembled in Caxton Hall at 8 o'clock in the evening and sent a deputation, headed by Mrs. Pankhurst, to endeavor to see the prime minister, who had previously decided not to receive the deputation.

Enormous crowds of onlookers assembled in the vicinity of parliament square before the time set for the raid on the house, around which several thousand police had taken up strategic positions. The first noteworthy incident was the arrest, after a great deal of trouble, of a buxom equestrian suffragette, who tried to penetrate the police cordon to take a message to the premier. Next appeared the deputation under command of Mrs. Pankhurst, and it was received by the crowd with wild cheers.

Slaps Officer in Face.

Escorted by the police, the deputation arrived at St. Stephen's entrance to parliament, where it was met by Chief Inspector Scantlebury, who handed Mrs. Pankhurst a letter from the premier, regretting his inability to receive the deputation.

Angry throwing the letter to the ground Mrs. Pankhurst exclaimed: "I stand on my rights as the King's subject to enter the House of Commons," and she endeavored to force an entrance.

The police tried to induce the woman to disperse quietly and then began to take the members of the deputation by the arms to lead them away. To the surprise of the spectators, who were massed around the entrance, Mrs. Pankhurst slapped Inspector Jarvis in the face, knocking his cap in "Shame," and several of the spectators told the suffragette leader that she had no provocation to do such a thing.

A moment later another member of the deputation, Mrs. Saul Solomon, knocked off the inspector's cap a second time, while others made determined attempts to rush the cordon of police. Eventually the entire deputation was placed under arrest.

Many Notables Arrested.

By this time a second deputation had left Caxton Hall, accompanied by some hundreds of suffragettes and others, and an attempt was made to reach the House of Commons through the underground passage, leading from Westminster bridge. This too, was unsuccessful, but for two hours the whole district was in a state of uproar the police dispersing the crowds and arresting women by the wholesale. The windows of many of the Government buildings were smashed with stones wrapped in paper.

Altogether twelve women were arrested, including Mrs. Pankhurst, Mrs. Solomon, the Hon. Mrs. Haverfield, daughter of Lord Abinger; Miss Margaret, daughter of Lady Margaret; Miss Maud Johnson, niece of the vicar of the parish, and many other prominent women.

Detroit Entertains Countess Aberdeen

Detroit, June 29. — Detroit today paid homage to Lady Aberdeen, the wife of the former governor-general of Canada and the president of the International Council of Women, now in session at Toronto. Lady Aberdeen arrived in the city early this afternoon and until the time she addressed a meeting on the relief of tuberculosis in Ireland was the guest of the city. First a yacht ride on the river was arranged, and this was followed by a tea at the Country Club at Grosvenor Point.

Tonight she explained how she founded the Irish Industries' Association, Irish movement to revive the old Irish lace trade, and defend the hand-worker on linen against the fraudulent misrepresentation by the producers of machine-made linens. Until she took up the cause, the producers of machine goods traded on the reputation of the hand goods.

Through the stimulus given by the association, the forming of depots for the disposal of the goods in Dublin, London and Paris, has been proved a big success. The Irish handicrafts have been saved, and with their survival has come a revival of the study of the old folk songs, accompanied by the reservation of the Irish music and legends.
