SPLENDID HORSES WERE FEATURE AT MT. BRYDGES FAIR

Races Were Greatly Enjoyed by Big Crowd—Directors Well Pleased.

FRUIT WAS EXCELLENT

Ladies Took Keen Interest in the Fair and Had Many Fine Entries.

[By Our Own Man.] Mount Brydges, Oct. 3.—A record crowd visited the Canadoc Fall Fair held here today, and helped materially in making the show an unprecedented success. The directors spared no pains or expense this year, and the results exceeded even their expectations.

Early in the morning, large crowds from the surrounding districts began to appear on the grounds. The railways, too, contributed their share, and by noon the grounds were packed. Perhaps the feature of the fair was the potato race. This event consisted in horsemen with wooden spears or pointed sticks, without dismounting, taking the greatest number of potatoes, one at a time, from one barrel and depositing them in another, in 10 minutes. The barrels were placed 100 yards apart.

The Contest Starts. At a given signal, the contestants, wielding their spears, cantered to the barrel and then the contest began in earnest. There was more fun in the contest than in the proverbial bag of monkeys, and the spectators thoroughly enjoyed the manoeuvres.

At the conclusion of the time interval, the following were declared victorious: Messrs. C. Tuckey, C. Smith and D. Pering. The big speed event of the day was the free-for-all. No person watching the race could question the excellence of the horses bred around Mount Brydges if the fine racing specimens are any indication.

Splendid Horses. Mount Brydges has always been noted as a centre for horse breeding, and this year's entries were no exception.

The race proved to be one of the breathless interest sort, it being every man's almost until the last. There was an exciting finish and the winners passed under the wire in the following order: Chester Mitchell, by D. Campbell; Flora Mack, by E. Campbell; Otto Bars, by Dr. Bateman.

Was Called Off. The ladies' race, which would have been one of the special events, was called off because there were no entries.

In the lady driver's competition some excellent results were obtained. The ladies proved that they were capable of demonstrating some fine points in driving and proceeded to do so amid the enthusiastic applause of the crowd.

The winners were as follows: Miss Campbell, Mrs. Woods and Mrs. Lamont. A special prize in the harness class for the best single turn was won by C. Wyatt 1, and R. Arnold 2.

The exhibition of horses was the real treat of the show. Never in the history of the fair have there been such splendid specimens placed for the judge's awards.

The Heavy Draughts. The draught class revealed some fine heavy animals in good condition. The agricultural horses were also good, with a large entry, and competition, as usual, very keen.

In the general purpose class, while the showing was not as large as in the others, yet the quality was good, and the judges experienced much difficulty in awarding the ribbons.

The carriage and roadster classes maintained their enviable reputation as usual, and provided hard work for those making the awards.

Cattle Scarce. Cattle entries were small in comparison with former years, most of the classes being only partly filled.

Sheep were divided into two classes: long wool and medium wool.

Some Fine Sheep. In the long wool class some excellent rams were penned in good condition. There were also some good ewes. 2 years and upwards, which delighted both judges and spectators.

Medium wool varieties were also of unusual qualities. Swine were a good class with some fine specimens showing. Some particularly large boars added novelty to the exhibit.

In the dairy product class the best manufactured in butter was shown. The class included the showing of layer cakes, dark and light; best 5 pounds of honey and best 2 quart of maple syrup.

Specials were given for the best two loaves of bread. Much favorable comment was evoked from visitors on the splendid fair exhibit. The principal showing was in apples, including Northern Spies, Baldwins, Greenings, Russets, Pippins, Colverts and Snows.

Some fine pears and peaches were shown, while conspicuously placed in the exhibit were large bunches of grapes, both colored and white.

The Ladies' Work. In the ladies' class the principal winners were: Miss Short, Mrs. McCutcheon and Mrs. Fish. In the carriage horse class A. Blakie, J. Hill and T. Tanton had the largest number.

BIG STEAMER ASHORE ALL PASSENGERS SAFE

"Sinking Fast" Wireless Call Was Sent Out by the Spokane.

[Canadian Press.] Seattle, Wash., Oct. 4.—All passengers of the Pacific Coast Steamship Company's steamer Spokane, are reported safe today on the steamer La Touche, of the same line, which took them off when the Spokane went ashore last night near Cape Lazo, 100 miles north of Victoria, B. C.

Details of what happened after the wireless call "sinking fast" went out from the Spokane will be known when the La Touche, a freighter, reached port here today. Another of the company's steamers, the Alki, is standing by the wrecked vessel. The Spokane was bound here from Skagway, Alaska. She lies today close to the spot where she was beached in 1911 after striking a rock in Seymour Narrows. She is the second of the company's steamers to get into trouble this season, the steamer State of California having struck an uncharted rock in Gambier Bay Aug. 17, and sunk, carrying down 37 passengers and seven members of the crew.
