lips, and though Mr. A. E. Welch probably was backed by the majority of citizens for the position, there is a tendency among all of those interested in advancing the city to set behind Mr. Phillips and give him the broadest opportunity to advance the interests of London in general.

Messrs. Wood and Metcalfe are enthusiastic over the opportunity that present themselves to London. "We came here recently and investigated many thousand dollars in land," said Mr. Woods. "Other real estate men are doing the same thing. They are putting this property on the market at very low prices. Yet we have been told by citizens that we should not have invested our money in London property. How do they expect their town to go ahead if they talk that way? What is needed in this city is a pull together, a chasing in of the knocker on the street. London people don't realize what a city they have."

Here To Stay.

"We are not making real estate men. We have made our home here and we intend to remain in business. So far the real estate expansion in London has been on a conservative basis. People don't need to buy unless they want to, and no one can go far wrong at the prices that are being paid. With the proper spirit London can force to the front. We don't want to be mistaken for advice-givers, but these are our friendly impressions as newcomers who see things from a different perspective."

Mr. A. E. Welch stated this morning that he wished Mr. Phillips every success in his position. Mr. Welch believed that he could have attracted much capital to London to be invested in railways and industries.
