

CZAR'S CAVALRY ARE NOW MAKING ADVANCE FAR INTO HUNGARY

Crossing Hills on Kirlibaba-Marmaroksisget Road.

BIG VICTORY IN VOLHYNIA

Thirteen Thousand Prisoners Taken in Latest Thrust.

Besides defeating the Austro-German forces in Volhynia and continuing their advance, the Russians have commenced an invasion of Hungary with cavalry forces which appear to be well through the Carpathian Mountains. The official communication issued from Russian general headquarters yesterday, contained the announcement that cavalry had advanced along the Kirlibaba-Marmaroksisget road, Kirlibaba is in the Carpathians, northwest of Kimpelung. Marmaroksisget is in Hungary, 40 miles south of Jankontza pass, which Russian troops are approaching on the Galician side.

PRISONERS STILL COMING IN.

PETROGRAD, July 17.—Via London, July 18.—2:28 p.m.—The official communication issued from general headquarters yesterday, contained the announcement that a "Zeppelin" appeared yesterday above Riga and threw thirteen bombs on the lower part of the town.

"In Volhynia, in the region of the lower Lipa, our troops continue to press the enemy. Prisoners are still coming in.

"Northwest of Kimpelung, our cavalry have advanced along the Kirlibaba-Marmaroksisget road.

The emperor has sent the following telegram to Grand Duke Michael at Tiflis:

"With joy I learn you have assumed the offensive. Regarding victories gained by our Caucasian heroes, give them my warm thanks and my confidence in their future determined devotion."

The official announcement made in the afternoon follows:

Foe's Resistance Broken.
"In Volhynia, to the east and southeast of Sushni (Sushlitsky) village, our brave troops, under Gen. Sakaroff have broken down the resistance of the enemy. In battles in the region of Pustomyr more than 1,000 German and Austrian prisoners have been taken, together with three light guns, two heavy guns, machine guns and much other military booty. In these battles, brave Gen. Vladimir Dragmireff was wounded in the leg by a shrapnel splinter.

"In the region of the Lower Lipa our successful advance continues. The enemy is making a stubborn resistance. In battles in this region we took prisoners or 226 officers and 5,372 men. We also captured 24 guns, of which 12 were heavy pieces, together with 14 machine guns, a few thousand rifles and other equipment. We also have captured in this vicinity 51 officers and 2,185 men.

"The total number of prisoners taken on July 16 in battles in Volhynia is approximately 15,000 men and 12,637 rifles. We captured 20 guns, of which 17 were heavy pieces; a great number of machine guns and much other material.

"In the direction of Kirlibaba, on the frontier of Transylvania, we have occupied a set of new positions.

"In the region of Riga skirmishes on both sides have been successful for us, and part of the enemy's trenches have been taken, together with prisoners.

"On the Caucasus front.—The offensive on the right flank of our Caucasian front is developing. A great success was obtained on July 16 by the Plastyn division of Kuban Cossacks, by bringing to the column of Gen. Gornastseff.

GAINS EAST AND WEST CARRY ALLIES NEARER TO THE GREAT GOAL

Great Britain Made Happy by News From Front.

THE BRITISH GAIN IS BIG

Russians Smash Teuton Front To a Depth of Several Miles.

LONDON, July 17.—10 p.m.—The successes of the Entente Allies are following each other with great rapidity. Today brought news of further important gains for them on both the western and eastern fronts, arousing enthusiasm among the British public hardly less than that caused by the reception of the first news of the allied offensives.

The dispatch of Gen. Sir Douglas Haig today shows that the steady progress of the British army is forcing an ever-deepening salient into the German lines, and the commander-in-chief for the first time produces evidence of the shape of documents captured from the Germans, giving testimony as to the high price the Germans are paying in casualties.

Important British Gain.

The British have improved their position along almost the whole of their line of the front, the attacking force by assault 1,500 yards of German second line positions north of the Bazentin-le-Petit wood, a strategic German position at the Waterlog farm between Longueval and Guillemont, besides completing the capture of the whole of the village of Ovillers la Boisselle. These gains bring the British almost to the crest of the Albert plateau, where stretches the German line in casualties.

Great Russian Success.
The news from the eastern front today was equally important. The Russian commander, Gen. Kuchuk, has launched an offensive against Field Marshal Von Hindenburg on the Divina River, and Gen. Lindenberg's troops southward of Lutska have been compelled to retire behind the Lipa River, while in the course of Sunday's fighting in Volhynia the Russians captured an additional 12,000 prisoners and 30 guns. Gen. Von Linsingen's retirement, according to the Petrograd military critics, represents a great Russian tactical success. It was preceded by heavy fighting, in which the Russians smashed the Teuton front on a width of a mile and penetrated several miles into their positions.

Costing \$30,000,000 Daily.
The war is now costing Great Britain \$100,000,000 daily, but with such news as the success of the Entente Allies this sacrifice is no longer grudging. While the powers of endurance of the Teutonic Allies should they be forced to act entirely on the defensive, have still to be tested, the British nation is full of confidence. It is taking nothing for granted, however, but is fully prepared to acquiesce in the advice of its leading ministers, like Foreign Secretary Grey and Chancellor of the Exchequer McKenna, who are publicly exhorting to the nation the need of patience.

Mr. McKenna, in his statement today that the daily cost of the war was \$26,000,000. He told the House that the nation's war expenditure might be a month ahead. He also intimated that it would become necessary to raise fresh borrowings.

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German Staff Tries to Revive Hopes of the German People

LONDON, July 18.—3:39 a.m.—The German general staff has issued an appeal to the people of Germany for confidence in the conduct of the war, according to a Rotterdam dispatch to the Daily News.

"Never has the world experienced anything so stupendous as the present battles," says the appeal. "Never has an army braved what ours has braved."

"The appeal adds: 'The enemy is sending out every few hours claims to have taken villages, woods and thousands of prisoners. In reports that are no longer couched in the language of soldiers, but are fantastic hymns of victory that mock truth, in an effort to undermine German confidence.'"

PARTIES IN CONFERENCE

Chancellor and Leaders Consulting Today, and May Reach Agreement.

New York, July 18.—A New York Times cable from Berlin last night says:

"The result of the chancellor's conference with the party leaders in the Reichstag tonight is being awaited in political circles with even keener interest than the news from Verdun.

While it is said that the conference will deal with the general military, foreign and political situation, it is believed Dr. Bethmann-Hollweg will take the leaders into his concrete confidence regarding his flexible peace program. Signs have not been wanting recently to indicate that the powerful Moderate, Conservative, National-Liberal and Catholic elements are striving to bring about a rapprochement between the chancellor and the pan-Germans, not without some prospects of success, particularly as the chancellor's principle that the longer Germany's enemies prolong the war, the heavier will be his price of peace, leaves the door open for reconciliation with the annexationists.

Less Moderate Terms.
The impression in political circles is that, in view of Germany's continued heavy sacrifices in blood and treasure, Von Bethmann-Hollweg's peace conditions today are decidedly less moderate than at the time of his last Reichstag speech. The theory that the present general offensive is the Entente Allies' supreme effort, that after its failure peace should come in sight, has gained some hold on German public opinion, which continues to view the French and English offensives with uncanny equanimity as some-thing destined to failure and frightful losses on both sides.

A Sign of Peace.
As it is necessary to prepare the ground for peace thoughts the public sees additional reassurance in the general military situation, especially in the fact that a systematic public propaganda for unity regarding peace conditions or war aims August 1, when the peace conference is expected to meet, will be a sign of peace.

The British statement of views was presented in writing, but with the explanation that it is merely for the information of the United States, and was not in the nature of a protest. Now that the department has ruled formally that the submarine is entitled to recognition as a neutral vessel, it is understood the diplomatic representatives of the Allies are awaiting instructions from their foreign offices.

250 MEN GO ON STRIKE AT PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS

Claim They Are Not Receiving Pay Given on Other Jobs.

OTTAWA, July 17.—About 250 men employed by the Parliament Buildings, Ottawa, went on strike today, and as a result the work of demolishing the ruins is seriously handicapped. The men who worked on the "dump" have been receiving 25 cents per hour, as specified in the Government fair wage plan, but claim that other contractors in the city are paying higher wages (30 cents per hour), and that they are entitled to the same consideration.

INSURES 16,000 OF ITS EMPLOYEES

NEWARK, July 17.—Involving a total of more than \$16,000,000, the Prudential Insurance Company today announced the institution of a system of insuring every one of its more than 16,000 employees without expense to the workers. This is said to be the largest single amount of life insurance ever covered by any company in the world.

MORE GOLD FOR NEW YORK.
NEW YORK, July 17.—Another shipment of approximately \$20,000,000 in gold and securities, bringing the total up to \$185,946,000 since the movement began, was received here today from London, via Halifax, and deposited at the Assay office to the account of J. P. Morgan & Co. Seven automobile trucks were required to deliver the shipment.

HIBERNIANS AT BOSTON.
BOSTON, Mass., July 17.—Delegates from many parts of the United States and Canada have arrived for the fifth biennial convention of the Ancient Order of Hibernians, which will be held here this week. A high mass in the cathedral, at which Cardinal O'Connell presided, signalized the opening of the convention today.

COST OF LIVING GOES UP.
OTTAWA, July 17.—According to the labor department the cost of living is still on the upgrade in Canada. Taking sixty cities in June the cost of a budget of staple foods was \$5.31 as against \$5.37 for the same in May. The principal increases are in meat, eggs, sugar and beans.

TWO BROTHERS DROWNED.
KINGSTON, July 17.—Two sons of Samuel Stinson, residing at Tichborne, were drowned at Crow Lake on Sunday, James, aged 19 and Melzar, 15. The latter was in a boat when it drifted out on the lake. He could not swim and was unable to get out of the boat which sprang a leak and he went down. His brother lost his life in attempting to save him.

ELEVEN THOUSAND PRISONERS NOW IN HANDS OF BRITISH

Booty Taken in Offensive Includes Many Big Guns.

GERMAN BREACH WIDENS

Almost a Mile of Second Line Positions Taken Near Bazentin le Petit.

[Canadian Press Cable.]
LONDON, July 17.—The British official statement on the progress of the campaign issued tonight, reads: "Rain and heavy mist again interfered with the progress of our attacks of importance took place today. We have captured some more prisoners, and the total number of unwounded German prisoners taken by us since July 1, is 159 officers and 10,775 other ranks."

"The German losses in artillery are even greater than at first reported. The captured German guns already collected by our troops now include 5 8-inch howitzers, 3 6-inch howitzers, 6 6-inch guns, 5 other heavy guns, 37 field guns, 30 trench howitzers, 66 machine guns and many thousands of rounds of ammunition of all descriptions."

"The above is exclusive of many guns yet brought in, and numbers destroyed by our artillery bombardment and abandoned by the enemy."

"The official statement issued this afternoon follows:

Capture 1,500 Yards More.
"Further important successes have been gained by us. Northwest of Bazentin-le-Petit wood, the British have captured German second line positions on a front of 1,500 yards. The large number of German dead in this sector shows the extent of the heavy casualties which the enemy has suffered since our advance began."

"East of Longueval we still further widened the gap in the German second line by capturing the strongly defended position of Waterlog farm."

"On our left flank, in Ovillers and La Boisselle, where there had been continuing hand-to-hand fighting since July 7 we captured the remaining strongholds of the enemy, together with two officers and 124 guardsmen who formed C. Stoen's brigade of heavy garrison. The whole position is now in our hands."

GERMANS ADMIT LOSSES.
Berlin, July 17.—Via London, 4:55 p.m.—An artillery bombardment of intense violence is in progress at many points on the Somme district north of the sea on the western front, the war of attrition between the German lines being heavily pounded by the British guns.

Local attacks in the Somme region, as a result of which the British penetrated Ovillers Wood, are reported.

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SEVENTY-SIX LORDS AND 98 COMMONERS OPPOSE IRISH BILL

Indorse the Views of Lord Lansdowne on Measure.

PARTY IS GROWING DAILY

Bill Must Travel a Rocky Road Before It Becomes Law.

LONDON, July 17.—11:03 p.m.—Premier Asquith announced today that the new Irish bill will be introduced in Parliament before the adjournment of the autumn recess, and repeated that the whole Irish question would be submitted to an imperial conference after the war.

It is understood that the bill will not be presented until next week, and in the meantime the delay is allowing the opposition to crystallize, which threatens trouble and indicates that the measure is to have anything but a smooth passage.

An important meeting of a new party, representing the Lansdowne views of the Lloyd George compromise was held in the House of Commons today. Seventy-six members of the House of Lords and 98 members of the House of Commons were present.

It was said that the party is daily growing larger. Resolutions were carried by acclamation, declaring that the bill was a betrayal of the trust reposed in the Government and that the Government will take necessary steps to suppress treason and sedition in Ireland and uphold the supremacy of the law."

HURLED HIMSELF BEFORE PASSING FREIGHT TRAIN

Former Windsor Man Commits Suicide in Galesburg, Mich.

WINDSOR, July 17.—A telegram received here this evening from Galesburg, announces the death there today by suicide of William J. Smith, a former resident of this city. Mr. Smith left Windsor nearly twenty years ago, and at Galesburg built up a large business in general trade.
