NOT ONE MEAL LOST BY CANADIANS SINCE THE WAR COMMENCED

Officer Tells Wonderful Efficiency of Army Service Corps.

APPEAL FOR RECRUITS

British Army Has Only Missed Two Meals in Two Years.

One of the largest audiences which has attended an indoor band concert in London since the beginning of the war heard "The History of the Army Service Corps," as related by Lieut. A. C. Morton, in the armories Sunday night.

He traced its development from before the South African war, when it was scarcely in existence, to the present day, when it formed the means of transporting supplies for all the armies of the Empire. It was a fact, he stated, that the British army had lost only two meals since the outbreak of the struggle. That was in the first six weeks of the war during the retreat from Mons, before the Canadians had reached the field. It was attributable to the Army Service Corps that the Canadians had not missed one meal, or that not one life had been lost in the transportation of the millions of men from various parts of the Empire.

By a diagram on a blackboard he interpreted the work of the corps, showing how goods from all parts of the world were gathered at points on the French coast, carried from there by train to depots, where motor lorries received the goods and carried them to the waiting horse transports, which made the last portion of the journey to the firing line.

His address was in part an appeal for recruits, and that was evidenced by the frequent applause.

Major Coles also delivered a short recruiting appeal.

The brass band of the 149th Battalion furnished the music for the evening, assisted by the pipe band of the A. M. C. Training Depot.

LONDONERS' COTTAGES DAMAGED WHEN GALE SWEEP PORT STANLEY

Storm Was Wildest Which Has Raged in Many Years.

FISHING TUGS ALL SAFE

Loss Along the Beach Will Run Into Hundreds of Dollars.

PORT STANLEY, Oct. 22.—Damage that will cost hundreds of dollars to make good was caused by the gale that raged here yesterday. A cottage owned by J. Stanfield of London, near the Casino, had its veranda torn away and part of the roof damaged. A cottage adjoining, owned by G. Steele, also of London, lost a portion of the roof and the veranda.

Fences and various sheds suffered severely, many being blown away.

Beneath the Casino the cement is badly cracked as a result of the sand being washed out and the floor having nothing to support it.

The board walk after the gale was twisted completely out of shape. The waves washed away the sand from under it in many places, and then carried away sections of the planking.

Many of the hydro-electric poles are at an angle, but the line is intact. All along the beach the booths were filled with sand and rubbish washed in by the water.

The fishermen all got into port safely, but they declare that the storm was one of the wildest which has swept Lake Erie in many years.

While the gale was at its height a gust struck Finnegan's poolroom down on the beach, and turned the whole building almost completely around.

OFFICERS AND TROOPS SAW WHITE COMRADE AT BATTLE OF MARNE

Experts Found Many Who Told of Seeing Visions.

SPECIAL INTERVENTION

Pastor Tells of Wonderful Events in World-Famous Retreat.

"The Battle of the Marne and the Vision of the Angels" was the subject announced by the minister, Rev. W. R. McIntosh, which was responsible for a number of visitors, as well as a good representation of the congregation at the evening service in King Street Presbyterian Church yesterday.

The Bible, said Mr. McIntosh, is full of the doctrine of angels and God's intervention and help constitutes the doctrine of Christianity. The term "angels" the speaker defined as God's coming for the special help of men on special occasions. His idea of "angels" was not the medieval conception of a being with shining wings. An "angel" might be intervention, a dream, a vision, specially sent to help, or unseen help.

Many instances. The Bible and history abounded, he declared, in instances of intervention, apparently by a superior power, when the occasion was of sufficient importance and significance to demand it. The battle of the Armada was an unexplainable victory otherwise.

"The throne of heaven is no more vacant today, and was no more vacant the first week of September, 1914, than it was in those early days, when men admitted the intervention of God," said the preacher.

Concerning the stories told of "The White Comrade" at the famous retreat and battle of the Marne, Mr. McIntosh referred to the testimony of the idealist, Harold Begbie, the well-known English writer, in his book, "On the Side of the Angels."

"Many saw visions," he said, "and a believing man, argues for the possibility of angels," said the preacher. "Before writing his book he collected a great deal of testimony, and interviewed some dozens of officers of all ranks and men, who testified to having seen visions. From a military standpoint the problem of the successful retreat and subsequent victory is difficult to explain. The enemy outnumbered the Allies two to one when the retreat began, and even after the reinforcements at Paris, the victory was won with the Allied forces only five to eight in comparison with the strength of the enemy. The Allies were hopelessly outnumbered."

Mr. McIntosh next presented the testimony of the great military expert, Hilaire Belloc, as contained in two exhaustive books on the war, the first dealing with the retreat from the Marne, and the second, a volume of 400 pages, with the battle of the Marne.

Belloc's Views. "Belloc," said Mr. McIntosh, "regards the battle of the Marne as the greatest battle in human history, because of the issues depending upon it. He considers it a turning point in the war. It was of the greatest significance to the world, the result should be successfully made until the reserves were met, and the destiny of the world depended upon the winning of the battle. He has his own theory in regard to the success of the retreat, in which the British played a prominent part. He admits that while greatest credit is due to the magnificent discipline and endurance of the soldiers, it is impossible not to think that there was the intervention of a superior will on that occasion. The success of the retreat and battle was not only of great significance in the history of the war, but in the history of the world and the liberty of man. The occasion was one of those of sufficient importance and significance to demand the intervention of a superior power."
