## CHARGES GOVT. IS UNFAIR TO THE DAIRYMEN

Oxford Member Declares They  
Are Not Getting Protection.

### OLEO BILL IS DISCUSSED

Measure Has Only Three Sup-  
porters On the Govern-  
ment Side.

OTTAWA, May 25.—(By Canadian Press.)—The House discussed oleomargarine today from the afternoon until late in the evening; and, as the debate drifted on and on, hope of prorogation this week slipped gradually away. The debate at times was keen and cut straight through party lines. Since 1917 when oleomargarine was first admitted, its importation and manufacture has been permitted from year to year. Today's bill, as introduced by Dr. Tolmie, minister of agriculture, proposed to continue importation and manufacture indefinitely. But, pressed from both sides of the House, Dr. Tolmie early in the debate intimated his willingness to make the bill applicable again for one year only. S. W. Jacobs of George, Etienne Carlier, who is the only member of Jewish faith in the House, created some merriment by his reference to the constituent of "oleo." He cited loud as one of them.

Mr. Jacobs' View.  
"I should be the only person in the House to object," Mr. Jacobs exclaimed, "but I am broad enough to consider the matter from a purely Christian standpoint. If I am willing to put my soul in danger by eating oleomargarine what business is it of any other person in Canada?"

J. J. Dennison of Joliette eventually moved the six months' bill, but his motion met with an overwhelming defeat. On the Government side of the House Sutherland (South Oxford), T. H. Thompson (Hastings) and E. E. Fraser (Wellington). On the Opposition side, Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King and about half his following, including Hon. T. A. Cresser and all the National Progressives, voted against it. And it was defeated by 130 to 33, a majority against of 97.

The bill was then read a second time without further division and went into committee.

Amendment Lost.  
An amendment by Donald Sutherland (Oxford South) to prohibit the use of milk, cream or butter in the manufacture of oleomargarine, was defeated by a majority of 61; yeas, 17, nays, 78. John Best (Dufferin), H. R. Morphy (Perth), J. W. Edwards (Frontenac), Hon. William Smith (South Ontario) and Donald Sutherland (Oxford South) voted against the Government.

R. J. Manion (Fort William) moved an amendment to permit the sale of oleo until March 1, 1923. This carried without division.

The bill as amended was reported from committee after a motion by J. A. Robb (Chateauguay-Huntingdon) that the ingredients of every package of oleo should be plainly marked on the package, was refused.

When Dr. Tolmie moved the second reading the members immediately began registering their objections to the measure.

Mr. Robb (Huntingdon), Mr. Sinclair (Guelph), Dr. Edwards (Frontenac), John Best (Dufferin) all opposed the bill, as interfering with the dairy industry.

Clark Opposes.  
Dr. Michael Clark took the opposite side from a free trade standpoint.

S. F. Glass (East Middlesex) held that people had become reconciled to the oleo industry, but wished to see it kept within certain restrictions. He quoted from a circular issued by the National Dairy Council, expressing the view that margarine should not be presented in such shape, appearance and color as to induce people to believe they were getting something like butter.

Mr. Glass declared that the Government should make up its mind what it was going to do, and do it. The people were tired of having this subject shelved.

W. D. Euler (North Waterloo) declared the bill should be allowed to go through as it was presented to the House. It was not reasonable to say that if a person wished to purchase oleo he should be refused that right. If it was a proper article of commerce, and apparently the Government was satisfied that it was, so there was no justification in interfering with its manufacture and sale.

Supported by Euler.  
Mr. Euler had no particular objection to prohibiting the importation of margarine, but he could see no justification for interfering with its manufacture at home. He would support the bill.

Donald Sutherland (South Oxford) said that though the manufacture and importation of oleomargarine had been permitted for three years now, the public had never been informed as to what it contained. The consumer had a right to know what he was paying for, and the Government department responsible for the inspection of oleo manufacture should give out that information. There was a great deal of reason to believe that a large amount of oleo was actually sold as butter, and there was no article of food about which there was so much fraud and deception.

Mr. Sutherland criticized the Government for being unfair to the dairy industry. Protection was essential in Canada. Farmers and manufacturers should be protected alike. Mr. Sutherland announced his intention to move an amendment in committee, prohibiting the use of dairy produce in the manufacture of oleomargarine, and that oleo should only be admitted to Canada under a duty.

Mr. Sutherland moved an amendment prohibiting the use of milk or butter in the manufacture of oleo. Deputy Speaker Bovin ruled this out of order, on the ground that only one amendment could be considered at one time.

Mr. Sutherland said his amendment was an amendment to the amendment. It was adopted on this understanding.

### MELBOURNE U. F. O. IS PLANNING PICNIC

Melbourne, May 25.—Arrangements are well under way for a U. F. O. picnic to be held here on June 22. A fine program is being prepared and it is expected there will be a large attendance. The U. F. O. has been handling a considerable quantity of supplies lately, including a carload of flour and a car of feed. A car of coal may arrive shortly. The recent showers have been most beneficial to the crops all through the district. Rain was very badly needed.

## ASK STATEMENT OF CHARGES IN WAGE SCHEDULE

Railway Employees Are Pre-  
paring For Commencement  
of Negotiations.

OTTAWA, May 25.—Representatives of the employees of the Canadian National Railways have asked for a statement of the changes in the wages and working conditions schedules which the management recently gave notice they would endeavor to secure this year, according to an announcement today of the brotherhood officials. In previous years when the request for schedule adjustments had gone from the workers to the management the latter asked for a complete statement before entering into negotiations. "Now that the shoe is on the other foot, I think we are entitled to the same provision," A. R. Mosher, grand president of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees stated this evening. "It would be unfair to expect the employees' representatives to enter a discussion affecting wages and working conditions without having an opportunity of discussing the proposed changes beforehand."

## ALL ESTIMATES MUST BE CUT

British Government Orders  
Twenty Per Cent Reduction  
in All Departments.

LONDON, May 25.—All the government departments have been instructed imperatively to cut the estimates for next year's supply service 20 per cent. A circular issued by the treasury to the various departments instructs the departmental chiefs to "forthwith undertake any procedure desirable," and to make a searching examination of their expense bills, so as to enable them to present for the next fiscal year adequately reduced requisitions.

## EVANGELIZATION IS NEED OF MASSES

Presbyterian W. M. S. Dis-  
cusses Important Problems  
of Church.

TORONTO, May 25.—Intensive effort was urged upon the delegates to the annual meeting of the executive of the Women's Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church at the opening session here this afternoon to light the fires of devotion and worship among the non-Christian peoples of the Orient, and to serve the spiritual needs of the people of the far-off frontiers of Canada.

Mrs. John McGillivray stated that the membership of the Women's Missionary Society had increased in the last two years from 60,000 to 80,000.

Rev. Dr. R. Drummond of Hamilton, Ont., chairman of the general board of the Presbyterian Church, spoke on the relation of the Women's Missionary Society to the general work of the church, and Mrs. J. S. Mackay spoke of the foreign work of the church and its outlook.

Mrs. Mackay made a strong appeal for the women of foreign lands. Evangelization was the great need for the masses, she said. She said there was now a great door of opportunity open for this.

## DEEP WATERWAYS WILL HELP SARNIA

President O. E. Fleming Re-

Lawrence Project.

SARNIA, May 25.—The deep waterway project was lauded here tonight by O. E. Fleming, K.C., president of the association, who was the chief speaker at a joint meeting staged by the Chamber of Commerce and the city council. During his address President Fleming stated that the St. Lawrence project was a great aid to this city, and in his review of the project he lauded the work. About 40 industrial chiefs here composed the audience.

Put Explosive Charge in Bar-  
rel of Old Gun—Stood  
Too Close.

### INJURY IS NOT SERIOUS

Hon. Manning Doherty Will

Monday Evening.

BLENHEN, May 25.—Joseph Cox, a local lad, was injured in the fireworks celebration yesterday. He was experimenting, boy-like, and had an explosive charge in the barrel of an old shotgun. When the explosion took place he was too much in line with the end of the gun barrel, with the result that a "BB" shot in the mixture in its line of flight entered his side, and a physician had to be called. 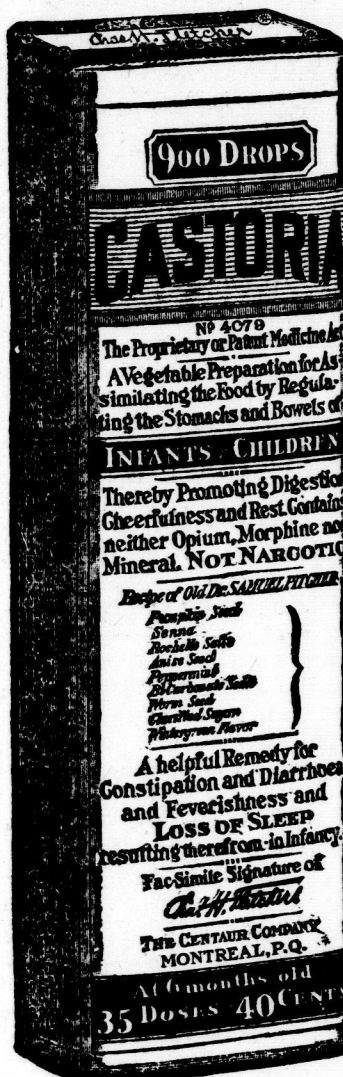
