CITY ASSURED ABUNDANCE OF SPRING WATER

Reports of Well Drillers Make Utilities Board Confident of Supply.

LOCATIONS KEPT SECRET

Extensive Operations Will Commence As Soon As Tests Are Completed.

Snow accompanied by cold weather within the past few days has failed to hamper the work of the drillers of the Ohio Well Drilling Company who are still searching for water beneath London.

Another two weeks, the London Advertiser, was advised on Thursday, will note the completion of the second and final survey of the city and vicinity. The drillers are now engaged in their last site near Sunning Park, on the north branch of the Thames.

Directly this work is concluded a detailed report will be submitted by the drillers to the Public Utilities Commission. The drillers will advise the commission as to the best sites where to commence real operations. While all parties concerned are bound not to reveal the extent or the nature of their findings until the commission has considered the same, members of the latter body have quite lately expressed great satisfaction with the reports that have been made from time to time.

Without stating any specific location they have intimated that they have been practically that London now need not worry for years to come over any possibility of a lack of fresh water.

GRATIFIED WITH CHURCH PROGRESS

Members of Egerton Street Baptist Hold Quarterly Business Meeting.

Following the prayer meeting the quarterly business meeting in connection with Egerton Street Baptist Church was held Wednesday night. Various reports were submitted from the departments of the church and Sunday school showing the finances of the church to be in good condition and that very fine progress had been made in the work of the church as a whole.

The Young People's Society were granted permission to make a double tennis court to be built of cement at the rear of the church, which will occupy some of the space made vacant when the old church is removed. It was also decided to make a canvass of every member of the church to awaken a general interest in the church.

STATES GOSSIP FOOD OF HUMAN LOBSTERS

Maitland Street Baptist Church was packed with people all eager to hear the lecture Tuesday night by the Rev. Dr. Sowerby on the unusual subject, "Only a Lobster." The chairman, T. H. Yull, introduced the subject and the doctor, then after the invocation by Dr. Sowerby, the program opened with a Harry Lauder imitation by Master Sam Munroe, London's clever juvenile Scotch comedian. He was greeted with great applause, which was only equalled by that given to Mr. Ed. Webster, who rendered a solo, his accompaniment being played by Miss Marjorie Allen. Miss Doris Yull gave two quaint little readings, the naturalness of which caused much laughter. Master Munroe and Miss Dorothy Munroe then gave a Scotch duet, which the audience received with much applause.

The doctor then went on to deal with the human lobster, a type which he said was probably not so much to blame after all, because he was probably born that way and could not help himself any more than the sea lobster. The human lobster has the same characteristics as the other, and just as the lobster lives on putrid food the lobster of the sea, which is gossipy, pointed out that attractiveness of features is not merely so desirable as attractiveness of character. He cited Dorcas, Paul, Abraham Lincoln, John Brown, Bismarck and Queen Victoria as examples of comparatively mediocre looks redeemed by attractive characters. He then ended the lecture by the plea to his audience to stop being lobsters, feeding on the gossip and scandal of life, and start being helpful, kind, considerate, Christian men and women.

The program concluded with a duet by the Munroe children and a song by Miss Dorothy Munroe, very dainty and sweet in her crisp, girlish portraiture, very appropriately the title of her song, "The Girl of Yesterday," and the crowd dispersed after singing the National Anthem.

MAY ASK ABOUT \$100,000 SURPLUS

Mayor Only Commissioner Likely To Raise Question.

Should there be any discussion at the inaugural meeting on Thursday of the Public Utilities Commission relating to the \$100,000 surplus received from the Provincial Hydro Commission, the question must be raised by one person only, the new member of the commission, Mayor J. Cameron Wilson. Assurance to this effect was given The London Advertiser on Thursday morning.

The commissioners have long since agreed as to the best manner, in their opinion, in which this sum should be expended, and their decision is on the minutes of the board. Should Mayor Wilson, however, choose to introduce the question for discussion again, it is fully expected that the "old" will be blown off, so to speak, and the matter will claim another thorough consideration.

That the \$100,000 should be expended for placing the wires in cables beneath the surface and additional street lighting is the belief of the commissioners.

GRISDALE URGES GREATER CARE IN MARKETING

Dominion Deputy Minister of Agriculture Addresses Dairyman's Convention.

ASKS FOR CO-OPERATION

Claims Danish Bacon Has Supplanted Canadian Product in British Markets.

Delegates to the fifty-fifth annual convention of the Dairyman's Association of Western Ontario, being held in London Wednesday and Thursday of this week at the Masonic Temple, were officially welcomed Thursday night on behalf of the city and the province by the Hon. J. H. Grisdale, deputy minister of agriculture, to whom a considerable portion of the evening program had been given for an address to the delegates found it impossible to reach London, in time from Guelph, where he had spoken Wednesday afternoon, but the convention prevailed upon Dr. J. H. Grisdale, deputy minister of agriculture at Ottawa, who was one of the prominent speakers during the afternoon, to continue his stay in London and fill the place of the Hon. Mr. Doherty.

MARKETING THE TEST

"Now," he said, "we can produce all these things, but if we can't market them, we don't know where we are going to land. Marketing is the test of the whole thing. Many remedies have been suggested, many panaceas tried. Efficiency was one of the great things needed, he affirmed. "It is essential, therefore, that we keep on producing as good quality as possible, utilizing every power we own to the limit. We may find times hard now, but they are going to be harder if we don't use the opportunities presented in the Dominion today."

"We must get our products into good shape, have them on the market in good time, and in saleable condition," averred Dr. Grisdale. "The manufacturer knew the value of sending out his products in fine boxes, cartons and bottles; the farmer had neglected to do the same sort of thing; they must improve their methods. You must appreciate the value of advertising if you are going to put over goods on the market and hold the market."

Appeals for Memorial. Dr. Gibson of Guelph Agricultural College, made an appeal to the dairymen on behalf of the memorial hall being erected in Guelph at a cost of \$125,000 as a tribute to the ones who had given overflows from the college.

Frank Hens, secretary of the association, extended, on behalf of the minister of agriculture, an invitation for the convention to meet in Guelph next year. John Scott, president of the association, occupied the chair.

A varied program of Scotch dancing and singing was given in addition to the speeches.

"The embargo on cattle in the mother country had seriously affected this export trade. The attempt to send chilled beef to the old land had met with strong competition from the Argentine, but if the Canadians should, upon the lifting of the embargo, be allowed to ship cattle to the pasture land in Britain the outlook would be brighter," said Dr. Grisdale.

The quality of bacon exported had to be raised in the opinion of the deputy minister, if the trade was to be held in England. Canadian trade with Britain had fallen off greatly in the last few years. Danish bacon was now commanding a better price in England than Canadian bacon. The only way to remedy this was to raise the quality of the Canadian meat.

Co-operative Warehouses Aid. A short resume of conditions at the present time in regard to both eggs and meat, the flax industry, tobacco growing the last two of which were recovering from a slump of a short time ago, was given by the doctor. In addition he spoke of the aid of the co-operative warehouses in several points in Canada, where Canadian wool was being marketed, and the work of the experimental farms.

Wednesday afternoon was the milk and cream producers' session at the convention. At 2 p.m., E. H. Stonehouse, of Toronto, president of the Ontario and National Dairy Councils, spoke on "Dairy Problems from the Standpoint of the Milk Producer," and was followed by Dr. J. H. Grisdale, deputy minister of agriculture for Canada, who gave a paper on "Corn for the Western Ontario Dairy Farmer."

Contractors Have Until Jan. 25 To Complete New Collegiate

Under the terms of its agreement, the Kingston Construction Company has until Jan. 25 to complete the new Collegiate Institute. L. E. Carrothers, architect for the board of education, informed The London Advertiser to this effect on Thursday morning.

Architect Carrothers explains that while the original contract between the city and the Kingston company stipulated that the building be ready for occupation by Dec. 31, the time limit was subsequently extended.

"I made this change on my own initiative," Mr. Carrothers said to The Advertiser. "Such is within my power. I did it because the work was necessarily delayed during the summer by a serious strike. All contractors are subject to a handicap of this nature at any time or on any job, and it is only fair that such should be taken into consideration."

"We expect the collegiate to be ready about the 25th of the month, and we will have a school that will defy competition elsewhere in Western Ontario at least."

WESTERN WILL OFFER COURSE IN SOCIOLOGY

University Authorities Arrange Extension Lectures for Social Service Workers.

Classes To Meet Two Evenings Weekly For Six Weeks.

At a large gathering of social service workers and those interested in sociology and effort along similar lines, together with representatives from Western University, an extension course under the auspices of the university on social work and philanthropy was planned.

The course, it was decided, should begin on the first of February and continue for six weeks, two evenings a week and two lectures a night. Volunteer workers are expected to benefit most from the course and it is particularly in their interest that the course is designed. Every volunteer worker in churches and other institutions, engaged in social work, will be eligible for the course.

Col. W. J. Brown, the executive secretary, has asked Rev. Peter Bryce, head of the Child Welfare department of the social service council to be one of the lecturers.

WORK OF LONDON ARTIST ADMIRER

E. R. Glen Collection of Oil Paintings Delights Art Lovers.

A peep into Edward R. Glen's temporary studio over the G. T. R. ticket office finds an art gallery of such immense attraction that a peep won't satisfy at all. The visitor longs to linger there and see all the beauties of the paintings, which line the walls on every side. So transparent are the colors and so delightfully have they been chosen that a first impression leads to the conclusion that the paintings are done in water colors. It is a very delicate handling of the oils and a free use of the pastel shades, especially the plentiful use of lovely shades of blue, which gives the impression of water color paintings. The pictures, however, are characterized by a strength of treatment which could only be procured through oils.

Mr. Glen, who has only recently returned after two years spent in study and work in France, has a very splendid assortment of paintings, over two hundred of them, all dealing skillfully with subjects which are intensely interesting.

An old French peasant figures conspicuously in a number of his most likeable paintings, such as "Mending a Sail," "Grand Pere," etc. There are some delightful peasant-maid studies and outdoor scenes which appeal by reason of their color and composition. One study of tall poplars on a Pleydary Road is very fine. A delightfully unusual treatment is found in "Moonlight, Normandy." In fact all the scenes are little pieces of the old land, which bring with them their direct appeal from the brush of the artist.

ASK INCREASED GRANT FOR AGED PEOPLE'S HOME

Representatives From the Women's Christian Association Wait On Finance Committee.

WILL CONSIDER REQUEST

Mayor Wilson Points Out the Need of Utmost Economy by City.

Some pointed remarks on the city's care for its indigent patients placed in the aged people's home were addressed to the finance committee of the council Wednesday afternoon by a delegation of women representing the Women's Christian Association. They were asking that the city raise the per diem allowance pay to the home from 60 cents to \$1.00.

It was in reply to the suggestion of Mayor Wilson that the women might raise the money to maintain their institution in some other way, than by an appeal to the council, that rather nettled the women and they replied rather pointedly, telling the members of the committee that it was the city which sent the patients to the institution and surely the city was willing to pay 15 cents. These were the patients' that were causing the home to go behind financially.

During the remarks Ad. Cunningham stated that he felt positive that the women would not be granted more than 90 cents a day, which led Mrs. (Rev.) J. Currie to ask "shall we feed them according to what we get?" Mrs. C. B. Hunt was the first-spoken woman. She said that the home was caring for eighty aged people and with the rate of pay for the city patients at 60 cents, the finances were going behind, the deficit now being \$4,000. \$28,000. Mrs. C. Although we are women, said Mrs. Hunt, we like to be honest and we cannot pay our debts on sixty cents a day. Miss C. McIntosh said that the cost of maintenance in 1921 was \$26,850, \$73.12 a day. The city paid \$25.30 a day or 40 per cent of the cost and had more than 50 per cent of the patients. Mayor Wilson stated that the city was in a very unfortunate financial position at the present time. It was desirable to lay down the policy that the city would have as little to do as possible with charitable institutions financially. The city could not be a father to them all. He thought that the boards should get out and get the money to run their institutions without asking the council for it.
