

DECLARE PEACE BETWEEN IRISH GOVERNMENTS

Representatives of Free State, Ulster and Britain Sign Agreement.

CO-OPERATION PLEDGED

Terms Provide For Reorganization of Police in Belfast Area.

London, England, March 30.—An agreement designed to restore and promote peace in Ireland, through co-operation between the northern and southern governments was signed this evening by representatives of both the provisional government and the northern parliament, and counter-signed by representatives of the British cabinet.

The conference of representatives of the three governments, which was called by the British government, adjourned at 9:30 o'clock tonight after reaching the agreement, which was described as most satisfactory. Winston Spencer Churchill, secretary of state for the colonies, was expected to make a statement on the agreement to the House of Commons late tonight.

The terms of the Irish agreement are announced by Winston Churchill as follows:

First—Peace is today declared.

Second—From today the two governments undertake to co-operate in every way in their power with a view to the restoration of peaceful conditions in the unsettled areas.

Will Reorganize Police.

Third—The police in Belfast are to be organized in general accordance with the following conditions:

1. Special police in mixed districts to be composed half of Catholics and half of Protestants. All specials not required for these forces to be withdrawn to their homes and to surrender their arms.

2. An advisory committee composed of Catholics and Protestants will assist in the selection of recruits for the special police on duty, except the usual police men to be informed and numbered.

3. Arms and ammunition issued to the police of a mixture of other content of arms when women are not on duty, and an official record must be kept of all arms and ammunition issued.

4. Any search for arms is to be carried out by a police force composed half of Catholics and half of Protestants, the military rendering any necessary assistance.

Form New Court.

Fourth—A court is to be constituted for the trial, without jury, of persons charged with serious crimes, the court to consist of the lord chief justice and one of the lords justices of appeal in Northern Ireland. Any person committed to be tried by that court (a) if he so requests or (b) if the attorney-general for Northern Ireland so directs.

Serious crimes are those punishable by death, penal servitude or imprisonment exceeding six months. The government of Northern Ireland will take steps to pass necessary legislation to give effect to this article.

Fifth—A committee is to be established in Belfast with equal numbers of Catholics and Protestants and with an independent chairman, preferably a Catholic or a Protestant alternately in successive weeks to hear and investigate complaints of intimidation, outrages, etc., such committee having direct access to the heads of the government.

The local press is to be approached with a view to inserting only such reports of disturbances as shall have been considered and communicated by this committee.

Sixth—Irish Republican army activities are to cease in the six counties and throughout a method of organizing special police in the six counties outside of Belfast shall proceed as speedily as possible on lines similar to those agreed to in Belfast.

Plan Further Meeting.

Seventh—During the month immediately following the passing into law of a bill confirming the constitution of the free state, being the month within which the Northern Parliament is to exercise its opinions and before any address, in accordance with Article XII of the treaty, is presented, there shall be a further meeting between the signatories of the agreement with a view to ascertaining (a) whether a means can be devised to secure unity in Ireland, or (b) failing this, whether an agreement can be arrived at on the boundary question otherwise than by recourse in the boundary commission under the treaty.

Eighth—The return to their homes of persons expelled is to be secured by the respective governments and the advice of the committee mentioned in Article Five is to be sought in cases of difficulty.

Exiles To Return.

Ninth—In view of the special conditions consequent on the political situation in Belfast and neighborhood the British government will submit to Parliament a vote, not exceeding £500,000, for the ministry of labor in Northern Ireland, to be expended exclusively in relief work, one-third for the benefit of Catholics and two-thirds for Protestants. The northern signatories to use every effort to secure the restoration of the expelled workmen and wherever this proves impracticable owing to trade depression, they will be afforded employment on relief work.

Tenth—The two governments can, in cases agreed upon between the signatories, arrange for the release of political prisoners in prison for offences committed before the date hereof. No offences committed after March 31 shall be open to consideration.

Eleventh—The two governments unite in appealing to all concerned to refrain from inflammatory speeches and to exercise restraint in the interests of peace.

The agreement was signed on behalf of the provisional government by Michael Collins, Eamon J. Duggan and Arthur Griffith for the northern government by Sir James Craig, the Marquis of Londonderry and E. A. Archdale, and for the imperial government by Winston Spencer Churchill, Sir Lansing Worthington-Evans and Sir Hamar Greenwood.

WOULD GIVE ONLY ONE VOTE TO EACH

TORONTO, March 31.—The bill introduced in the legislature by K. K. Howarth, and which provides for a "one-man, one-vote" amendment to the municipal act, passed the municipal committee today.

If it becomes law it will prevent a person owning land in two or more wards of a city or town having more than one vote on a money bill.

RADIUM HELPS CURB DISEASE

Expert Says Treatment Succeeds Where Medicine and Surgery Fail.

IS NOT YET A CURE-ALL

Treatments Issued by London Institute Since 1911 Total Nearly 100,000.

LONDON, March 31.—Dr. A. E. Hayward Pinch, medical superintendent of the Radium Institute, in his report of the work of that institution for last year, combats the idea that radium has no therapeutic value. He declares that this theory originated from well-meaning but ill-informed practitioners having very little personal experience.

"Radium," he declares, "is not a failure when used intelligently and scientifically, and applied to the treatment of those conditions which experience has shown are amenable to its action. No honest worker claims, or has ever attempted to claim, that radium is to be regarded as a panacea, or as a cure for malignant disease, and many years must elapse, and much more research and clinical work be done, before it will be justifiable to use the word 'cure' even in selected cases of malignant disease."

"It is best, therefore, to speak only of 'arrest of the disease,' and this can truthfully be affirmed in very many instances. Patients whose lives who have speedily terminated, and who would have suffered much intense agony, have been enabled by radium treatment to live for many years in comparative comfort after all the known resources of medicine and surgery had been exhausted."

"At the present moment," states Dr. Hayward Pinch, "the institute case-sheets comprise the names of many

patients suffering from recurrent inoperable malignant disease who first presented themselves some seven, eight, nine or ten years ago, and are now leading useful and comparatively healthy lives, the disease having been rendered quiescent by the treatment which they have received."

Since the Radium Institute was opened in August, 1911, 7,750 patients have been dealt with, and nearly 100,000 treatments administered.

OPPOSES DAIRY SUBSTITUTES
