O.T.A. OPERATOR SENT TO REGINA

Tells of Receiving Ticket and \$600 To Leave Kitchener.

General Elliott Explains Circumstances of Raid At Sutton.

TORONTO, May 11.—The evidence of Sam McCutcheon and Lloyd Gordon, two operators in the enforcement of the O. T. A. against the proceedings of the public accounts committee of the Legislature this morning. Most of the raids described by McCutcheon were in Toronto, while Gordon's major activities were in Kitchener.

Gordon explained that in December, 1920, H. H. McCutcheon, who gave evidence yesterday, and he were sent to Kitchener to endeavor to get cases against the bootleggers there. They worked there for five days, then returned to Toronto for the week-end with either five or seven cases which they intended to prosecute.

On the following Monday they went to Stratford, and the next day reached Kitchener again.

As soon as they stepped off the train on this occasion, Gordon claimed, his uncle, Frank Letson of that city, sent word he wanted to see him, and told him they had received "spotters," and that a man named Struck wanted to see him. Gordon met Struck and a meeting was arranged for that night in Heuter's Brewery.

There were several men there whom he did not know by name with the exception of Struck. They told him that they had been advised to send him away, so he would not appear in the cases, Gordon said, and to offer him anything up to \$700. Gordon claimed his understanding was that this advice came from Toronto.

Got Ticket to Regina.
At any rate he agreed to accept \$600 and a ticket to Regina. He suggested Regina as the place he would go, and Struck went with him to Detroit, where witness said he was paid the money and given a ticket. They also gave a woman a ticket for Regina who had been connected with the enforcement of the O. T. A.

Gordon remained in Regina for several months, coming back to Toronto in June, when he applied to be taken on as an O. T. A. operator again. He said he had been told in Kitchener, when making the deal to go to Regina, that he could return in six months and get his job back with the department.

The department did engage him again to seek to ascertain if operators were in league with bootleggers, and particularly to investigate the suspicion that A. Corrian was protecting a number of places where liquor was being sold.

Sentenced to Jail.
Gordon was later sentenced to a month in jail for stealing a Victory bond, and after he came out of jail continued to be employed for a week in the investigations against places where liquor was supposed to be protecting in order to get something on Corrian.

Sam McCutcheon told of entering the service of the department under the name of Dunn, because he did not think he could get a job under the name of McCutcheon owing to the prejudice against his brother, H. H. McCutcheon. He told of being detailed to watch his brother by officials, not knowing that they were brothers.

His principal evidence was regarding disappearances of liquor seized, giving him the impression that officials did not turn over to the courts all the liquor they got.

Gen. Elliott Heard.
Gen. Elliott, former commissioner of provincial police, gave evidence this afternoon regarding the enforcement of the O. T. A.

The raid in Sutton, in the constituency of North York, two days before the federal elections, was stressed. It was a raid on a hotel in which a Conservative candidate and Conservative workers were staying, and liquor was found.

He said O. T. A. operators were sent to Newmarket as a result of a memo he received from the attorney-general.

As far as witness knew there was no political significance in sending him there. He did not know of the raid at Sutton until he read of it in the papers, but got a report shortly afterwards.

There was no rule in his department to ease up enforcement of the O. T. A. during the election campaign, nor any instructions to watch any particular party's operations.

BOARD HEARS FURTHER EVIDENCE AT ST. THOMAS

Will Give Decision in Case of Hill Versus Water Commission Soon.

ST. THOMAS, May 11.—Further evidence was heard Thursday by the arbitration board in the case of John Wynn Hill versus the St. Thomas Water Commission. It is thought that a decision will be rendered by the board within a few days.

The witnesses examined in behalf of Mr. Hill Wednesday afternoon and Thursday were: Charles Jackson, Edgar Johnson, William Pranglin, William McVey, Terence Brady, William Mackey, Frank McBrayne and Charles McCormick, all Yeomouth farmers. Aid. M. H. Penhale and Deputy Reeve Fred Carr of Yeomouth are among the chief witnesses for the water commission. Aid. Penhale took the options on the property in question and other land required by the city for water storage purposes, while Mr. Carr disposed of 83 acres of his land, comparable to that under arbitration to the city for \$110 an acre.

The property in question is 65 acres of valley and hillside land, which was expropriated by the city for water storage purposes. Mr. Hill was offered \$6,500, but demands \$16,300.

The arbitration board is composed of Judge Ross, chairman; Alex. Darach, representing Mr. Hill, and J. T. Webster for the city.

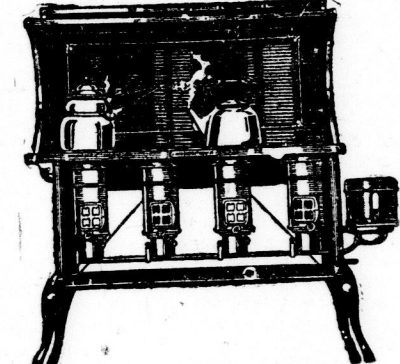

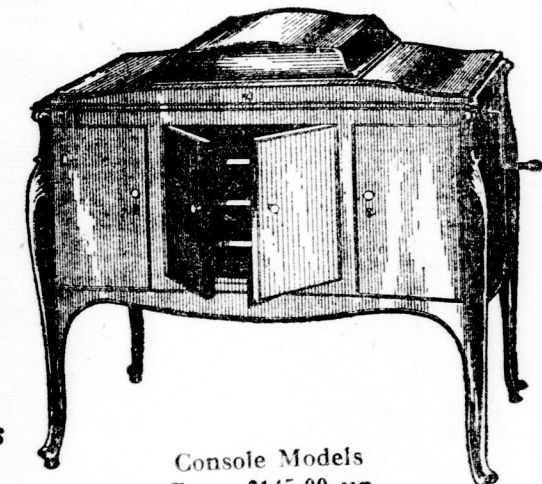
