In Theory Klan Is Non-Political, But Recent Elections in Indiana Were Dictated by Ku Klux "Information Sheets"-Secret Order Killed Bill in Ohio Legislature.

### "ANTI-NOTHING" SLOGAN DISPUTED BY FACT

Mr. Hignett, who gives his age as twenty-six years, enlisted in November, 1914, with the 25th Battalion, C.E.F., of Halifax, and was wounded in France in 1916 while serving with the 13th Royal Highlanders of Montreal. Two of these cases are the recent state election in Indiana and the vote on an "open-to-the-public" bill in the Ohio state legislature

In the Indiana elections, according to Mr. Hignett, the Ku Klux Klan, through its secret service, made complete investigations of every candidate for office. The Klan officers then hand. made selections of its candidates, and to every Klansman in the state was sent a circular of the various candidates, with directions.

The Ku Klux name did not appear the names of all candidates, mentioning each man's religion.




