ONE WOMAN SAVED

Efforts To Resuscitate Victims By Pulmotors

Detroit, April 16. - Four persons met slow deaths when an automobile crashed through a bridge railing at Dearborn road and Pere Marquette railroad crossing, plunged 10 feet into an icy creek and overturned on the bottom, securely imprisoning its occupants at 9 o'clock last night.

Mrs. Dorothy Gordon, 23 years old, 60 Winder street, alone survived of the five who plunged into the creek. She is in Delray Hospital in a critical condition, suffering from

shock and exposure. The victims were: Lester Cherry, 25 years old, 2046 Sixth avenue; Mr. and Mrs. Harry Shields, same address; an unidentified woman. The Detroit fire department's rescue squad and Springwells police worked for an hour trying to resuscicreek but life was extinct when they

vere dragged out. Trapped Beneath Machine. The occupants were trapped under he machine in six feet of water for ve minutes before rescuers released

o one side by a west-bound automo The machine was not upon the ailing and dived into the middle of ne stream after a drop of ten feet Rescuers were brought running to the deene, a lonely spot, by screams of Mrs. Gordon, who was thrown out of the car in its death leap and saved herself by clinging to the machine. Mrs. Gordon's cries were heard by Dell Purdue and Policeman Gerald, who were in passing machines. Purdue dived underneath the car and managed with great difficulty to release the occupants. In the mean-time a call was put in for the rescue squad of the fire department and

Claims Germany Willing For Solution of Ruhr Fuss

President Ebert Says Country Ready For a Just Peace and Honest Understanding With Nations.

Berlin, April 16 .- "At any moment guarantees the unity in the land of our fathers and the freedom of German labor under a just peace reached by an honest, free understanding from nation to nation. "The unfettered German worker is

willing to bear all burdens compatible with his capacity, and honestly to assume a due share in the so-bitterly-needed reconstruction of the world's sick economy.
"But under threatening mouths of

loaded murderous weapons, an unfettered German worker cannot now and never can develop."

Expresses German Willingness. President Frederick Ebert, in an exclusive interview granted to the writer—one of the extremely few touching on actual political questions he has ever given—thus repeated Ger-many's expressed willingness for

He coupled it, however, with a bit-ter denunciation of French procedure in the Ruhr, where he declared black Africans with loaded carbines and drawn sabres had driven several hunwives and children, from their dearlybeloved homes, sometimes destroy-ing their goods in the manner of vandals, simply because "these people showed fidelity to their fatherland." No Provocation. "A report of the Krupp factory council, in which Christian Unions and Free Unions as well as Com and free Unions as well as Commun-ists are represented, has proven in-controvertibly to every unprejudiced and open minded person before the whole world that there cannot be any talk of provocaation by the workers

against French troops.
"On the contrary, on the part of the Germans—workers and directors as well as laborers—everything humanely possible occurred to bring about a peaceful solution of the conflict at the Krupp works. "No weapon was raised on the Ger-

man side.
"Peaceful, unarmed workers did nothing more than protest the illegal penetration of armed French troops into the factory by quitting work. "Not a single hair of the French

was harmed.
"Where, then, was any threat? Ebert, waxing warmer, declared, "The mass murder of laborers at Krupps' on Easter Saturday is symbolical of the whole Ruhr district."
