

MONTREAL FINES SIMPLY LICENSES FOR VICE HOUSES

Report of Committee of Sixteen Charges Lessening of Prosecutions.

WILL TAKE ACTION

Declare the Sentences Hitherto Given Not Likely To Stop

Montreal, April 28.-There has been a lessening during the past year of the number of prosecutions co ducted in Montreal houses of ill fame, according to the annual repor report also gives inside informati of the famous January 18 confe-
