The unveiling of the memorial

The unveiling of the memorial tablet of the county of Middlesex in memory of 280 Middlesex heroes who gave their lives in the war was carried out at the University of Western Ontario this afternoon.

The service was one of the most impressive in the history of the county. Outstanding citizens of county and city, distinguished visitors from Canada and the United States, together with fathers, mothstates, together with fathers, mothers, sons and daughters, brothers and sisters, were present to pay tribute

In a blaze of autumn sunshine, a silent throng with bowed heads stood before the memorial tower of the main building of the university.

And standing there, too, was the leader of these men, Sir Arthur Currie, who came to honor their name, to uncover the tablet in praise of their sacrifice.

Long before the appointed time for the procession at 2:30, members of the faculties, students, soldiers and citizens, made their way to Western's campus, there to share in the expression of the love borne to the soldiers of Middlesex whose names are enabylined within the tower.


