That the murder was premeditated, has been admitted by Janisse in a statement to the police. Mrs. Janisse is said to have planned to shoot McMullin. At least, that is what neighbors of the Janisses told

the police tonight.

Mrs. E. Taylor, 314 Ellis avenue,
Windsor, where McMullin and his wife, Ethel, had called to leave their two-year-old daughter while they attended a theatre.

"Come outside, McMullin, we want to speak to you," Janisse said to McMullin.
