**More For Toronto Harbor.**  
Toronto, July 3.—At a meeting of the Toronto harbor commissioners, held yesterday, a letter was read from Hon. P. D. Monk, Dominion Minister of Public Works, in which he expressed himself with being well pleased with the work so far accomplished by the new board and convinced of the great possibilities of Toronto harbor. He was fully alive to the necessity of the work in connection with Ashbridge's Bay and the other harbor improvements now being undertaken and promised to do all in his power to bring them to a successful conclusion. When they had occasion to visit Ottawa in connection with Toronto harbor improvements he would make it his business to see that they were well received.

**Wants to Be Friendly.**  
Pekin, July 3.—Lu Cheng Hsiang, the new Chinese Premier, yesterday expressed to some of the foreign Ministers here his desire to hold and strengthen the friendly relations between China and the Powers. He said he hoped the powers would shortly recognize the Chinese Republic. The National Assembly yesterday passed the first reading of a bill providing for Chinese control of the post-office, which will result in the dismissal of 150 foreign employees. Commercial interests here argue, however, that foreign management of the post-office is essential, and expressed the hope that the Powers would intervene.

**False Reports on Fruit Crop.**  
St. Catharines, July 3.—Robert Thompson, a prominent fruitman and officer of the St. Catharines Cold Storage Co., stated yesterday that there is positively no foundation for statements appearing in certain Toronto papers to the effect that the fruit crop in the Niagara district is poor. The report, he says, is entirely misleading. Grapes never looked better, according to Mr. Thompson, who is in a position to know. Tomatoes are coming in fine. Currants and gooseberries are reported as good.

Mr. Thompson states prices will be rather high owing to the increased demand of the spinning and jam factories, which have no stock on hand and which are contracting for a large supply of fruit this year. A few growers are trying to raise the poor crop price in order to obtain high prices.

**Plot to Kill Kitchener.**  
London, July 3.—(C.A.P. Cable.)—A Daily Mail special from Cairo states that the British adviser to the Ministry of the Interior, public prosecutor and commander of the Cairo police, conferred with Lord Kitchener yesterday morning. It is understood the conference was conducted with the discovery of an alleged conspiracy to assassinate Premier Kitchener and the Khedive, who is in London. Four persons have been arrested, and the investigation is being continued.

**Methodist Minister Dead at Barris.**  
Barris, July 3.—Rev. Wm. Thornley, a retired Methodist minister, died here very suddenly yesterday shortly after breakfast, death being due to acute indigestion. He was in his 74th year. His wife and daughter at home survive him. Rev. A. K. Burks, of Dundas, is a nephew. Interment takes place at Newmarket on Thursday.

**War Against Strikes.**  
London, July 3.—War against the strike as a weapon for workmen has been declared by some of the old time labor leaders of Great Britain, including men who have heretofore advocated extreme measures to obtain better wages and conditions.

Philip Snowden, one of the cleverest of the Socialist members of the House of Commons, was among the first to sound the warning that the men were gaining nothing by continual strikes.

Now Keir Hardie, his more extreme colleague, says he is more than ever convinced that legislative action would produce more permanent results than could be hoped for from strikes.

**Atlantic City, N.J., July 3.**—While three thousand spectators stood to be startled to utter a single sound, the big dirigible balloon Akron, was shattered by the explosion of the gas bag, and blown to atoms, at 6.38 yesterday morning, a half mile off shore, over Absecon Inlet.

Melvin Vaniman, who had built the dirigible with the idea of flying across the Atlantic Ocean; Calvin Vaniman, his younger brother; Fred Elmer, Walter Guest, and George Bourhill, his crew, were instantly killed.

Melvin Vaniman, who started life as a teacher of music in Illinois College, later became a photographer and turned to ballooning to further his photographic work. He designed several balloons and was the chief engineer and the energetic spirit in the Wellman enterprise which failed.

The dirigible was sailing at a height of 1,000 feet, and had been in the air since 6.15. The huge envelope, containing 400,000 cubic feet of gas, was rent by the terrific force of the explosion, perhaps caused by expansion from the sun's rays. It burst near the middle. A mass of flames hid the ship from view.

For a space of possibly ten seconds the half million dollar dirigible was invisible, while the air about the spot where she had been hovering seemed to be all flames. The fire dissipated and then the ship's outline against the sunrise was seen to fall like a plummet.

First the understructure, or car, in which were penned the unfortunate men, held in by a mesh work put on after the second trip of the balloon three weeks ago, unable to escape, broke away from the envelope. It up-ended, the bow turning first in a slow arc. Then it reversed suddenly and plunged downward. Directly above, twisting in a long spiral was the gas bag, a smoking mass of rubber and silk, with flames shooting out from a dozen sections as it collapsed. It fluttered a moment and then streaked down after the car.

In the rescuit, something which appeared to be the body of a man, shot out to the left of the wreckage and hit the water before the rest of the descending mass. It was reported that this was the headless body of Calvin Vaniman. At 8.20 a.m. a message was relayed ashore from rescuers that this body had been recovered and that the other four members of the crew were entangled in the wreckage in 18 feet of water.
