The Strange Manner in Which the Ani-Tazewell County, back one mile from the main road, in a lonely, isolated spot in the deep timber, surrounded by hills and deep ravines, lives a family named Kleen. The Bloomington Pantagraph says. The house is an old-time log one, with door opening outside and but four and one-half feet in height. The interior consists of two rooms. The celling would not permit a man six feet high to stand straight. It is supported by logs extending across the room, with boards above but none below. The sides are papered upon the logs, and the general appearance of floors, furniture, etc., indicates careful housekeeping, but the interesting feature of this story is the circumstances in connection with Mr. Kleen and his family. For nearly eighteen years past Mr. Kleen has been confined to his bed and not during all this time has he been able to move any part of his body, not even as much as a finger.

The trouble originated with a severe cold. This produced a rheumatic affection which terminated in spinal disease. This was at the age of thirty-eight. Now Mr. Kleen is past fifty-six years of age. Twelve years ago he lost the sight of both his eyes and since then has not seen daylight.
