### NEW PULP MILL

Arrangements for reconstruction of the New Brunswick Pulp and Paper Company's paper mill at Millerton, burned two years ago have been made. The mill is to be in operation by March. Fifty to sixty men will be employed. Orders for a full year's work night and day have been secured. From fifteen to twenty tons of wood pulp will be produced daily.
