ON THE EVE OF REBELLION

ALARMING CONDITION OF AFFAIRS IN IRELAND.

Dillon has been arrested in Kilmahon, and is now in the hands of the authorities. The condition of Ireland is anything but encouraging. Pressure on our columns has been such that it is given below. The late despatches received this morning go to show that Saturday and Sunday were days of turmoil and strife in the green Isle. Dublin and Limerick are in a state of rebellion. The military in the latter city charged on the mob with drawn bayonets. Rioting and disturbance were rampant, houses and churches were stoned, "no rent" banners and "no rent" resolutions were numerous in different parts of the county, and the general feeling is one of great uneasiness. Bloodshed was freely indulged in, while a great many persons were wounded more or less seriously. A rousing meeting was held in New York, at which the mother of Mr. Parnell received a rousing ovation.

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PAINE AND VOLTAIRE.

CITY MINISTERS SUPPORTING THE COLLECTOR IN THE SEIZURE.

Dr. Williams' Views—Another Letter From Mr. Cooke—Opinion—A Large Demand for the Books—More of Them Coming In. Rera. Dr. Potts, D. J. Macdonnell, W. S. Rainford have written to Collector Patten approving of the seizure made by him of the works of Paine and Voltaire. Several ministers referred to the subject in their pulpits yesterday.

DR. WILLIAMS' VIEWS.

At the close of his sermon last night said he had been called upon by a World reporter, who wished to know his views in connection with the recent action of the collector of customs in seizing certain books. At that time he had said that he was in favor of the introduction of such literature as would tend to the improvement of the community for his action in the case. They could not do any other than to suppress these immoral and obscene publications, and they should do all in their power to suppress what must be social and moral destruction to the young people of the land.

DR. POTTS.

At the regular Sunday evening meeting of the Secular Society the seizure came up. Mr. Cooke spoke on the subject, and several extracts from his sermon were read in positive terms that the seizure was not authorized by the government, but was the act of a private individual. A correspondent writes: "The author of the article in the Mail is an ultra-liberal, and his preference for clericalism and for the fourth century with its religious persecution is the present."

DISTURBED ELEMENTS.

Fatal Results of the Great Storm in Europe—Great Damage to Shipping. LONDON, Oct. 15.—The parks are strewn with fallen timber. Many boats are ground in the Thames. Steamboat traffic is suspended. Very few places in England have escaped damage by storm. Over 400 houses were blown down, and southward sweeping casualties are numerous, but no great disaster is reported. The gale has severely damaged property in all parts of the country. Several persons were killed and many injured. Houses were unroofed, and unfinished buildings collapsed. It is reported that forty-five fishermen at Barmouth and Holyhead, Scotland, are lost.
