ANGELICAN WOMEN DIVIDED OVER SYNOD'S REFUSING EQUALITY IN COUNCILS

Some Approve Action, While Others, Looking To Future, Predict That Sex Line Will Be Erased In Canadian Church.

The silence of women in the churches is a historical fact that still weighs to find favor with the Anglican women of London.

The action of the General Synod of the Church of England in session here in barring women from a seat and vote in the synod is not causing any special agitation among the church women of this city, if the opinions expressed to The Free Press by a number of the leading local Anglican women are a criterion of the general feeling.

Mrs. A. A. Rice, wife of the rector of All Saints Church, and an active officer in the Huron Diocese W. A., declared that the action of the synod suited her "very well indeed."

"The work of the synod seems to me to be the part of the church activity in which the men of the church take the keenest interest," Mrs. Rice said. "Why not let them carry through. We as church women have so much to do in the church that we surely need ask for no further duties. There has been no agitation among the women for the right to sit in the church and I believe they would themselves vote down the suggestion if it were put to them."

Mrs. Rice declared that in her judgment, though she believes that the church has never been in the least hampered by the fact that they were barred from the synod. "I don't really feel the need of this privilege," she said.

WOMEN CAN WAIT

"I haven't heard any women clamoring for a seat in the synod," said Mrs. J. J. Abbey, wife of the rector of St. Paul's Cathedral, and a former diocesan officer of the W. A. "It will come of its own accord."

Mrs. Abbey's opinion. "The women can wait, there is no occasion for any agitation, and I don't think the women are bothering over the question very much. If they do get a seat in the synod, it will be representative, thinking, worthy women who will take the
