"Social and Recreational Life"
"Consolidation of Public Schools"

"The Business of the Country Mer-

chant."

The Saturday afternoon session will take on the nature of a "Field Day of Sports" under the supervision of play directors whose aim will be to have everyone, young and old, take part in common games — such games as the older ones played on the old school grounds "twenty years ago" and the modern though very similar games that their children are playing yet.
