"A very delightful time was enjoyed by a party of about twenty-five which gathered at the house of Mrs. J. MacQuarrie on Monday night to celebrate the golden wedding of her neighbors, Mr. and Mrs. Malcolm Campbell. Although Mr. and Mrs. Campbell had not themselves proposed to make any such a celebration of the anniversary, their friends in the city felt that it would be very im proper to allow it to pass without notice, and Mrs. MacQuarrie kindly placed her house at their disposal for the purpose. Those who were there included Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Gott and Mr., Mrs. and Miss Cavers of Ver-non; the Rev. Wm. Stott, Mr. Colin Campbell, brother of Mr. Campbell, Mr. and Mrs. J. #### Sarnia Presbytery

Hold Quarterly Meeting Wednesday

A report on the alleged anomalies of the system of government control of liquor in the province of British Columbia, given by the Rev. W. W. Peck of Vancouver, provincial pro-hibition organizer, and a discussion of conditions reported to exist in the congregation of Knox Church, Camlachie, occupied practically all of the morning session of the Sarnia Presbytery, which held its quarterly meeting in St. Andrew's Churc schoolroom, Sarnia, on Wednesday.

Trouble within the congregation at Camlachie, reported to be of a factional nature, in which the Rev. A. W. Gazley, the pastor, is the cen-etr, was first brought to the attention of the presbytery months ago, and it was reported that settlement had not been achieved. Members of the presbytery are very reticent concerning the matter, and after much discussion this morning a committee was appointed to hear, informally, both sides of the question and endeavor to smooth away the differences.

Mr. Peck described his address as an effort to warn the presbytery of of the nature of a "subtle campaign on the part of moderationists" that will have to be met in the forthcoming referendum.
