-THE war in the east appears to have reached a very critical point. Instead of reached a very critical point. Instead of routing those pestilential Japanese from their lairs, as the Emperor in such grandiloquent style called upon his viceroys to do at the outset of the campaign, the Chinese have suffered complete and ignominious defeat, both on land and sea, wherever the two forces have come into contact. The fight is no longer one for the independence of Corea. The Japanese have been masters of the situation in that peninsula for weeks past, and any reforms in the government of that county which they wished to institute could be undertaken without hindrance in China. This was claimed to be the fect of Japan when she began the war. It in the flush of victory she appears to have lost sight of the first cause of the conflict, and nothing short of the invasion of China and the capture of Pekin seems now sufficient to satisfy the victorious Japanese. Indeed, a worse fate for China than even that has been openly discussed in certain quarters. This is no less than routing those pestilential Japanese from

in certain quarters. This is no less than the division of the great Chinese Empire to three separate Kingdoms, under difrent rulers, and each separate from, and independent of the other. Just what grounds there are for these rumors we do not know, but it is certain that Japan is now concentrating her forces upon Pekin as rapidly as time and space will permit; and, if the great European powers do not interfere, we would not be at all surprised Chinese capital before two months.

But there seems now every probability that the European powers will interfere. Indeed, latest despatches bring us the information that an agreement has been reached between Great Britain and Russia under which these two nations will desettle the trouble between China and Japan. Such action on the part of these two great powers would of course be exdeprive her of the opportunity of dictating terms to her conquered foe, and indeed leave her with but small say in finally adjusting the various matters in dispute, Japan will submit without an effort to be deprived of the fruits of her victory re mains to be seen. It would, however, be useless for her to attempt to resist the united demands of Great Britain and Russia, as these powers have a sufficient force available to effectually back up their demands. Should the reports of European interference, therefore, prove correct, we may expect to see the close of

the war before many weeks. Doubtless the settlement of the conflict in this way would be in the interest of the world in general as well as of the Chinese Empire in particular. To break up that great empire now would be a world-wide calamity, and it would surely be a crime on the part of the christian nations of Europe, to stand quietly by and see chaes and confusion brought upon a nation com prising so many millions of people. While admiring greatly the pluck and energy displayed by the Japanese in this war, it nevertheless appears to be but just and right that other nations should interfere, and British subjects the world over will fully sympathize with the mother country in the move she appears about to make.

Narrow Escape From Poisoning.

Last Thursday noon Mr. J. O. Elliott, of Paradise, arrived at the office of Dr. G. Barnaby, of this town, having with him his two-year-old daughter Mabel, whom, he hastily informed the doctor, had got hold of a box of Paris Green. which he supposed had been carefully left in a corner of one of the outbuildings, after being used for the destruction of the potato bug, but which, through the playfulness of a kitten, had been dislodged and fallen to the floor, and that when he found the little one she not only had both mouth and hands full of the fatal poison, but that her clothing denoted that she had been amusing herself with the can and its contents for at least some ten minutes. Mr. Elliott also stated that upon discovering the dangereas situation of the little one, he at once washed out her mouth and administered a copious draught of mustard and water, which had the effect of producing vomiting in a few minutes, when it was discovered that the vomited matter of the stomach contained a large quantity of Paris Green, this being clearly denoted by the green color of the substance thrown off.

The gravity of the circumstance was immediately comprehended by Dr. Barnaby, who at once admistered as an antidete dialized iron, in teaspoonful doses, followed by an emetic of ipecac. This had the desired effect, and again produced extreme vomiting for a time, when the administration of the iron was continued at intervals of fifteen minutes for the next two hours.

From that time till the hour of seven in the evening the child was carefully watched, and as no further symptoms of poisoning were manifest, milk was freely given, when the little one fell into a natural slumber and passed a good night. On the following day she was taken to her home, with no traces of the effects of the deadly drug, and greatly to the relief of the fond parents.
