Wooden ships are reported to be practically unsalable in Europe, where the wooden steamer Eirini, which originally cost \$500,000 to build, was recently sold in Cardiff, Wales, for \$4,325. "A VOYAGE OF RENOWN"

No Wonder The Prince of Wales Is A Jolly Fellow.

A London despatch says: The Prince of Wales leaves on October 26th on H.M.S. Renown for Gibraltar en route to India.

Prince Charles, second son of King Albert of Belgium, has been appointed a midshipman on the Renown. The Renown is amply stocked with stores necessary for receptions, in addition to the requirements of those on board. Included in the stores for the use of the officers are 125,000 cigarettes, 2,000 dozen bottles of wine and 9,000 cigars, the latter in addition to 5,000 to be taken by the Prince himself. For the men of the ship there will be 5,350 gallons of rum and 4,900 gallons of lime-juice. Eleven black cats will be taken along as mascots.

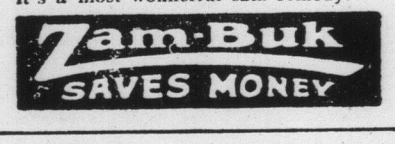

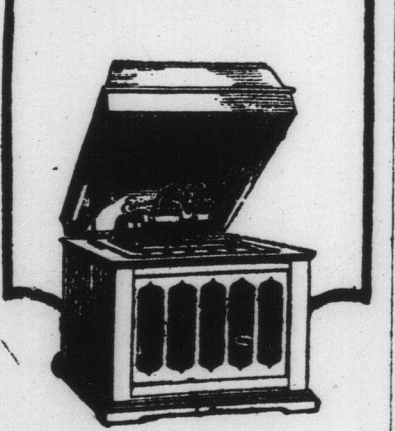

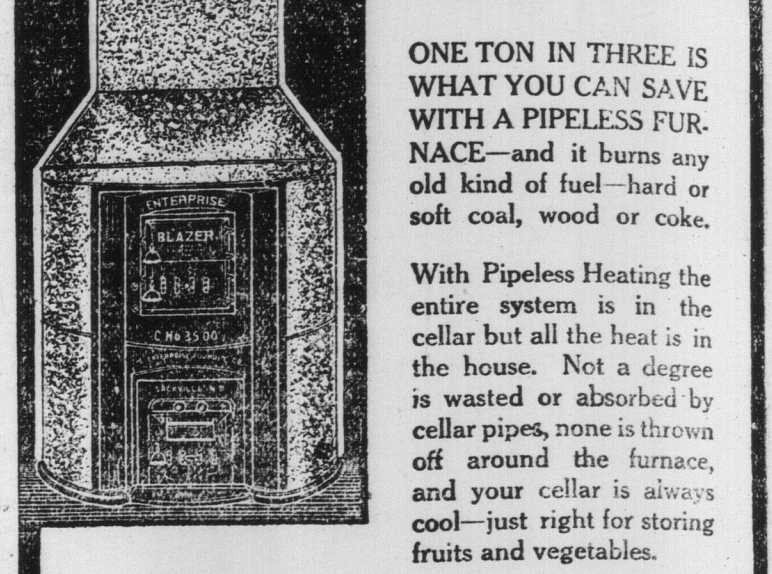
