## OLD FORT EDWARD—WINDSOR, NOVA SCOTIA

The only original blockhouse remaining in the Maritime Provinces, Fort Edward, Windsor, N. S., is to be preserved as a site of historic importance by the Canadian National Parks Branch. It was erected by Major Charles Lawrence in 1750 and was later called Fort Edward in honor of Colonel Edward Cornwallis, Governor of Nova Scotia. The fort occupies a commanding situation adjacent to the railway station and its meadows and old willow trees create a rare opportunity for a small historic park. A tablet has been placed on the wall of the blockhouse by the Nova Scotia Historical Society, but otherwise little attention so far has been given to the preservation of the site.

## CLEMENTSPORT

An error in name appeared in last issue. The correct spelling is "Pol-haemus", and is the surname of one of the original Loyalist families who settled in this vicinity.

The Annapolis Basin, that beautiful sheet of tidal water, twenty miles in length, and with an average width of about 4 miles was in many ways different in 1694, when Dr. Monts sailed his placid bosom—than it is to-day. In the old church is a copy of a map of Les Carbot of 1609, taken from a book in the Salem, Mass., library, by Mr. L. V. Shaw. It shows guns in position on both sides of the bay and within the basin in what is now the ballast ground, is marked a fortified island, which to-day has completely disappeared—Bear Island—is much larger than to-day. While half-tide ledge west of Goat Island is all that remains of another fortified island. Goat Island was fortified and a chapel is marked on it, while the fortifications at Port Royal are shown and look much the same as the remains would indicate to-day.

Great changes have taken place in the contour of the shore in recent years. In the memory of some—are visions of extensive picnic grounds on Morton's Point, then Ray's Point. There was a lovers lane, picturesque, winding, and beautiful,—two rows of trees separated it from the bank and inland another double row. To-day the two outer rows have disappeared, also the path and all that remains of the romantic rendezvous is the innermost row of trees and many of them have toppled over and been washed away. Doubtless similar changes have taken place at other points.

Then two years ago the waters teemed with fish. Smoke houses were erected all along the shore, and "Digby Chickens." (That luscious viand which they say when roasted over a camp fire will bring hungry hunters from miles with their noses sniffing the appetizing aroma borne upon the air) were produced. Lobsters parked themselves under every convenient rock and were so numerous few people bothered with them. The fish suddenly left, for a period of some thirty years—and the smoke houses and wiers disappeared, but now for the last few years they have come again. Mackerel, herring, pollock, cod and the scallop have been discovered and fished out. The lobster, alas! hardly gets up the basin, he is captured for the factories down the shore. Weirs are to be seen like brush fences all along the basin's shores, and many have made good catches. The salmon too come up the basin to the Bear River, Lequille and Annapolis rivers—and when the nets are prevented from being placed across the Annapolis River there will be some of the finest fly fishing in the Province.

Beside the regular service it was the occasion of a memorial clock presented and placed in the church by Mr. E. B. McPhinney, a former resident of this place in memory of his wife who departed this life in Lynn, Mass. After unveiling the memorial, E. H. Porter, in behalf of the donor, made the presantative address referring to the splendid Christian character of the deceased who, whilst a resident of his Bible Class in the Sabbath School closing by a sincere wish that all in the congregation would leave the room with a firm resolve to emulate the Christian attributes of this devoted follower of the Redeemer. Rev. Mr. McKenzie who was present, made a very appropriate address and then Rev. Mr. Heisler accepted the gift in behalf of the church in appropriate terms and the function closed.
