Dear Mr. Editor,-I am indebted to you for two letters, May the 16th and the 30th. Thank you for both and also for the copy of your letters therein enclosed, and for the magasine you so kindly sent me. I must tell you something about our work here. I have inquired for the photos you mentioned and could get none of any streets in Cairo except of the Mosqui street. Our house, however, is close to the post cffice, Abdul Az s street, running parallel with Mahamid Ali street, The German Jews live quits at the beginning of the Mosqui street in two or three by streets, the Arab and Spanish and Karite Jews near Hotel du Nile, also in the Morqui in a street called the Jewish street (Baretel Jahood), and in Sikke el Geaids, a continuance of the Mosqui street. 1 have forwarded a photograph of this latter street and hope it will reach you. The houses in this quarter are all very similar in sigle. If you can recall a large gaiden, called Garden of Ali Sher-11fl Fasha, in Abdul Az:z street, our house is exactly opposite to it. I perfectly agree with what you say in your letter about the giving of reliet to Jewish Converts. It does not make permanent the founda-tions of a Church.

The nearest estimate I can make as to the number of Jews in Cairo is about 15,000. I believe this to be the lowest. I find almost all the Jews here speak Arabic more or less well. Two thirds of them are called Arab Jews, amongst whom are a small number of Spanish Jeus, who, sithough they have kept up their hereastary language since their expalsion from Spain and their setting here have acquired such a good knowledge of the collequial Aisbio as to identity them with Arab Je vs with whom they have intermatried and formed one congregation, under one chief Rabbi. The number of the Spanish Jews is very small, a lew hunareds only. It is worth mentioning that amongst the Atab Jews is to be ionta the largest known congrega. tion of the Karites, who, as lar as I can gather, number only 30,000 in the world. You are no doubt aware that they are regarded as unorthodox by all other Jews, be-Cause they reject the Taimud. 1 hear this congregation numbers from 1 bol to 2 blu souls.

Le other thug of the Jews in Chiro are of European origin, Polish Who speak German as their mother tongue, and Greeke, natives of the isisha of Cortu, Ralishe, French, Russials, &o.; but amongst this latter the Polish Jews predomitate in number. 1. We have daily Morning Prayer in English and Arabic. The attend ance on Sandays varies from six to thirteen. Some Jews come, but the greater number are Sylians who have settled in Cairo, and who have either juined the Church of England or been brought up in it, On Sundays we have, besides the asual morning and evening services, an early celebration of the Holy Communion. On Thursday and all Fenat days we have early celebra tions of Holy Communion also, Last Sunday we had nine communloants.

2. We have an enquirers' room on the ground floor, which will be also useful to Miss Allen, who just arrived last Saturday. As soon as she has her drugs she will start a

dispensary. For the last month and more I have had a regular inquirer, who asked for no relief, coming three times a week for instructions pre paratory to his baptism. He wants to be baptized soon, before leaving for Europe. Lately he has been very ill, and the doctor said he must leave Osiro at once He has a liver complaint which may prove fatal. I believe he is in carnest. and if he continues so, and does not show signs of worldly motives, I hope to baptize him at All Saints' Church during this month.
