THE ONTARIO LEGISLATURE.

SPEECH FROM THE THRONE.

TORONTO, Jan. 24. Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

It gives me great pleasure to welcome you to your legislative duties, as members of a new parliament, convened for the first time since the general election of the past year. The occasion is made more auspicious by the advent of a new Governor-General, who by his public appearances and addresses has already created a most favorable impression on the minds of all classes in the Dominion. The fact that His Excellency is a trained and experienced statesman is a guarantee that the high and houerable position to which he has been called by Her Majesty will be ably filled.
It is satisfactory to know that during the

past year the bureau of statistics has continuel to do good service by collecting and disseminating trustworthy information respecting the agricultural and manufacturing industries of the Province, also that the higher practical experiments which have done so much o satisfy the establishment of the medel farm in connection with the agricultural coilege, have been continued with conspicuous advartage. The newly instituted egricultural examinations are also likely to prove of much service. I have much pleasure in anticipating that the means adopted for the diffu. sion of agricultural knowledge will, in a constantly increasing degree, make the farmers' calling more intellectual, attractive and remunerative.

It was my agreeable duty last year to congrainlate your predecessors upon the work done by the provincial beard of sealth. The report of this body shows that time and further experience have produced increased efficiency, and as well directed efforts to im-prove the sanitary condition of the people's homes promote longevity and increase the sum of general happiness, I commend to your thoughtful consideration the subject of rendering the services of the board still more eifectual and valuable.

It is with especial satisfaction that I congratulate you on the early and successful application of the tree libraries act, following the example promptly set by the provincial capital. Other municipalities have availed themselves of the providence of the act and taken sieps to tax themselves for the establishment of tree public libraries. I hope that this is but the beginning of a beneficent movement which will have far-reaching

You will be pisased to know that by a recent decision of the judicial committee of Her Majesty's Privy Consoli the right of Provincial legislatures to regulate the traffic in intexicating drinks is placed beyond contreversy. The judgments in this case and the insurance case, and the decision that lands escheating to the Crown for want of heirs are the property of the Province taken in connection with the observations made by the learned Judges in dispositions of the cases have had a reassuring effect on the public mind by showing that the Federal principle emb: died in the British North America Act and the autonomy it was intended to secure for the individual Previnces, are likely to be sale in the mands of the courts of final resort in constitutional questions.

At the last session of the Federal Parilament an act was passed declaring that the main lines of rallways in the Province, and all rallways now or hereafter connected with them, or crossing them, shall be subject to the legislative authority of the Parliament of Canade. It will be for you to consider to what enactments removes from the control of the Provincial Legislature reads which have been constructed under its authority and subsidized out of the Provincial Treasury, and also to consider whether the Etitist North America Act was intended to onable the Faderal Parliament to interfere in this manner with the legislative authority of the Provinces.

I am glad to have it in my power to state, as the result of negotiations between my Government and that of Manitoba, that a case has been agreed upon for a reference of the dispute respecting the interprovincial boundary to the judicial committee of Her Majesty's Privy Council. The first question be decided under the reference is the validity of the award made by the arbitrators in 1878, and a controlling condution of the inference is that the hearing before the Privy Council shall take place at a fixed date in the present year. The agreement includes interim arrangements in regard to all mat-ters of Provincial jurisdiction. A bill will be submitted to you for the purpose of giving full effect to those of agreement which

more effective and valuable. A blil to further improve the liquor license laws; a bill consolidating and improving the laws for the destruction of noxious weeds and for the arrest of diseases affecting fruit trees; a bill to authorize second locations by settlers who have obtained free grants and have parted with them; a bill to provide voters' lists for the unorganized parts of the Province, and a bill for the further improvement of the election law, and for the prevention and punishment of corrupt practices at elections.
In this connection I invite your attention to the expediency of jurther extending the aiready liberal franchise which prevails in this Province. The subject of protecting the public interest in streams used for the purpose of floating timber will, no doubt, again receive your extuest attention.

The reports of the various departments of the public service for the past year will be laid before you. Among these are, for the first time, reports on the important subject of forest preservation and the report of the inspector appointed under the adjudicator act to inspect the county cifices connected with the administration of justice in the province. The report of the inspectors of asylums show that further accommodation is needed for idiots, and I commend the subject to your humane attention.

The public accounts of the Province, showing the receipts and expenditures of the past year and the estimated expenditure for the current year will be laid before you. The estimates have been prepared with a view to keeping the expenditure as low as possible, censistently with a regard for the public inte ests.

I trust that the legislative labors of this first session of a new Parliament may be characterized by as high a degree of prudence, moderation and intelligence as those of any previous Parliament.

THE DUTY OF THE GOVERNMENT.

The question of the day is how best to get rid of the prevailing misery in our midst. The fact has been painfully brought home to Montrealers that distress and poverty have been on the increase this winter, and in such a climate as this it is really disgraceful that means are not adopted to alleviate the sufferings of our less fortunate fellow-citizens. Friday's issue of Tex Post contained an article advocating the employment of convicts on railways to be projected by the Government to open up the public lands of the Province to the North, and the only objection made to this is that it would creste a conflict be-

PRISON AND FREE LABOR, and menace therefore the welfare of the honest laboring man. Such an idea, we may state, is altogether erroneous, as the convict labor would only be employed in an exceptional undertaking, far removed from the cities of the Province. The project might be further extented in a beneficial manner to the community, in this wise. Distress arises from two causes. It is occasioned either by actual misfortune which cannot be avoided, arising from ac-cidents, sickness, etc., or it is due to a preventable cause, the love of drink and habits of vagrancy and leziness. What is wanted is to make the project reach that numerous class of offenders who are

ABLE TO WORK

but are not willing to do so, and who neglect their wives and children. The society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Women and Children is doing a good work in taking children from homes of wretchedness and vice, and placing them in industrial asylums; but the question arises, should not the unnatural parent in some way be made to contribute to their support. In too many cases the parent is glad to be relieved of the care of his children as it leaves him free to spend more money on himself, and instead of paying rent he will sleep in the winter season in the police stations and in the Reiuge. Under the present system the children are sent down to the Industrial echool for three to ave years according to age. This is all very well, but the matter should not rest here. Why is not the father arrested and made to give a reason why he does not sup-rort his family? In the absence of a good explanation he should be sent down at hard labor for three to six months, and, if there is no work in the jail, he should be set to work on the Government road, to open up the public lands, as before sugnested. There is no necessity to put such men to work with convicts; a separate gauge might easily be organized. At present the city is compelled to pay twenty-five cents a day for each prisoner, but, under an arrangement as proposed, we see no reason why the Government should exact any tax for prisoners sent to jail who are declared by the jail physician physically fit and able to work. We commend the matter to those in authority.

last year contributed to the state revenue the
sum of \$10,000 after paying the expenses of management, which simply means a reduction of

In reality we can offer no comparison, there is
none to offer because there is no revenue to
speak of. The advantage lies ontirely with the
American plan, the Canadian system is nowhere. A project in which we think there is

was proposed to 'ur reporter to-day, and we will give it as near as possible in the gentle, man's own words: "It strikes me very forcibly," said our informant, "that a few live men might work a revolution in the affairs of this Province, and something beyond mere patchwork is necessary. I will not speak of the public lants, the water power and the timber, about which our clitzens do not know enough. Goodness knows what ARUSES AND SCANDALS

axist under these respective heads the result of past years of mismanagement and chicanery. A beginning, however, ought to be made with the 'jail birds.' With the example of New York State before us, why cannot we Canadians go to work and improve things. We need not follow the Americans in everything. There are lots of ideas that might be carried out and the future will, no doubt, bring are t changes which are absolutely necessary even now. Every Canadian of intelligence who has the beat wishes of his country at heart knows that the great timber country to the back of us ought to be opened up. To effect this purpose the Government should at once put under way hallway to the little known but valuable timber through the little known but valuable timber

through the little known but valuable timber district. It would run, I believe, almost entirely through Government lands, and need cost the country nothing but the price of the ralis, for I advocate putting the convicts to work on the road. This is just the way magnificent roadways have been built in Australia and New Zealand. I would have the convicts kept under control by detachments of the Canadian forces from Quebec and from St. Johns' new military school, which by the way, ought to have been established in Montreal. This duty of our forces would be splendid discipline and almost as good as ACTIVE SERVICE IN THE FIELD.

Only a section of the force need be employed at any one time on this duty, and it would not interiere with the course of studies pursued at headquarters. It is a shame that in the city of Montreal we have to pay \$8 A COBD FOR FIREWOOD,

while in Toronto, with the forests of timber ever so much further removed, it is not more than half the price, for I am speaking from experience. With an inexhaustible supply of timber so near us to the North, the price of cordwood in Montreal ought to be DOWN TO \$4,

and I am certain that price could be reached if the Government only did its duty and opened up the North country in the way I have suggested. The road would cost the Government a mere nothing, and the revenue arising from the sale of timber, cordwood and public lands, which latter would be doubled in value by the railway, would be no trifle, and would materially help to reduce the Provincial debt. The road would also draw
