Born in Montréal, Québec, Mr. Roche (55) was, before entering Parliament, a journalist and lecturer and, from 1965 to 1977, the founding editor of the "Western Catholic Reporter" of Edmonton. He was first elected to the House of Commons in 1972 for Edmonton-Strathcona, was re-elected in 1974, and again in 1979 and 1980. Between 1977 and 1979, Mr. Roche was the Progressive Conservative Spokesman on External Affairs. In 1979, he became Chairman of the Progressive Conservative Caucus Committee on External Affairs and was appointed Parliamentary Secretary to the Secretary of State for External Affairs in 1979. He was a Canadian Delegate to the 34th General Assembly of the United Nations. He served for four years, from 1980 to 1984, as the International Chairman of Parliamentarians for World Order. He was named, in 1980, the Vice-Chairman of the Parliamentary Task Force on North-South Relations. In 1982, he was appointed a consultant to the Canadian Delegation to the United Nations Second Special Session on Disarmament. He was awarded the 1983 Peace Award of the World Federalists of Canada. In 1984, he was elected President of the United Nations Association in Canada. Mr. Roche is the author of books and articles on politics, development assistance, and disarmament, including Justice not Charity: Global Ethic for Canada, The Human Side of Politics, and United Nations: Divided World.
