A Message was received from the Senate informing this House that the Senate had passed Bill C-98, An Act to amend the Old Age Security Act, without amendment.

5.00 o'clock p.m.

Pursuant to Special Order made this day, the House reverted to "Motions".

"That, after the reading of Prayers in the said sitting, the House shall proceed forthwith to Government Orders which shall have precedence over all other business and, should the Order "House again in Committee of Supply" be called and read, the procedure now provided for in Standing Order 56(1) shall apply."

By unanimous consent, on motion of Mr. Pickersgill, seconded by Mr. MacNaught, the recommendation of the Commissioners of Internal Economy, set out in the Extract from the Minutes of a meeting of the said Commissioners tabled by Mr. Speaker on October 10, 1963, was concurred in.
