Some hon. Members: Five o'clock.

Miss Campbell: Mr. Speaker, let it appear on the record as well that the government whip asked that there be equal time.

Mr. Dick: In an out of the normal way.

Mr. Deputy Speaker: Is it agreed that I should call it five o'clock?

Some hon. Members: Agreed.

Mr. Deputy Speaker: It being five o'clock this House stands adjourned until Monday at 2 p.m.
