ARRANGEMENTS FOR THE PRACTICAL STUDY OF OSTEOLOGY.

The Skeleton may be studied practically in the Boneroom, where the Student will find typical specimens of the bones mounted on blocks. He can obtain from one of the Demonstrators any bone or bones he may wish to study, by giving a receipt. These bones must not be removed from the Anatomical Department on any pretence whatever; the Student may, however, keep the bones in his box for a period not exceeding one week, but at the end of that time he should return the bones and claim his receipt.
