of his councils, summon and call general 'affemblies within the faid governments: ' And that he had been graciously pleased to ' give power to his faid governours, with the ' confent of his faid councils, and the repre-' fentatives of the people, to make, constitute, ' and ordain laws, statutes, and ordinances, ' for the public peace, welfare, and good ' government of those provinces, and of the people and inhabitants thereof. And whereas ' his most excellent majesty, in pursuance of ' his faid royal proclamation, by his letters ' patent to his governours, has been graciously ' pleased to give and grant unto them full ' power and authority, with the advice and ' confent of his faid councils, under the cir-· cumstances aforesaid, to call general assemblies of the freeholders and planters within ' their respective governments. And also, ' whereas your petitioners (who have well confidered the present state and condition of ' the province) do humbly conceive, that a • general affembly of the people would very ' much contribute to its peace, welfare, and ' good government, as well as to the im-' provement of its agriculture, and the ex-' tension of its trade and navigation; they do · therefore most humbly pray your honour ' (with the advice and content of his majesty's ' council) to fummon and call a general • affembly of the freeholders and planters ' within your government, in fuch manner as ' you in your discretion shall judge most proper. 'Signed,
