

FOREIGN SELLING DEPRESSED WHEAT

Australia and Russia Offer Cut Rate Prices—Other Grains Off.

CHICAGO, Jan. 26.—Evidence that Australia and Russia were underselling the United States, had a bearish influence here today on the price of wheat. Largely in consequence the market, all the steady at the close, was 1/2c to 3/4c down, compared with Saturday night.

Failure of the Liverpool wheat market to respond to Saturday's advance on this side of the Atlantic led not only to general selling here, but also to enquiries as to the reason for the unusually independent course of prices at the British port.

The fact developed that offerings at Liverpool from Russia had been much more liberal than of late and were decidedly cheaper.

Australian cargoes appeared ready to be obtained at a discount from figures current in Chicago.

Mild temperatures and a snowfall throughout much of the winter crop region, gave wheat further impetus to upward advance. Result no reaction of any significance took place.

Rural offerings of corn were large, especially from Iowa and Illinois. There were also reports that Philadelphia was attempting to resell to the west, and was preparing to rely on imports from Argentina.

Corn weakened under the influence of a lack of shipping demand.

Selling by some of the largest packers was further impetus to upward advance. The face of higher prices for hogs. Eastern speculators did most of the buying.
