AGAINST PROHIBITION.

Wherever Prohibition Law Was Passed It Has Failed, Says a Methodist Divine.

Sackville, N.B., July 26.—At the morning session of the Methodist church yesterday, the pastoral letter drawn up by the recent Ministerial Conference held at Charlottetown, P. E. I., was read. Among the items in the letter designed "Church Enterprises" was the coming plebiscite, and to this portion of the letter Dr. David Allison, president of the Mount Allison College and University, addressed the congregation. The letter in dealing with the issue stated that no Methodist vote should be given other than for prohibition.

"I do not care to say," said Dr. Allison, "whose enterprise this proposed plebiscite is, but I do say that it is no enterprise of the Methodist church, and when I read that I am expected to commend this congregation to vote for prohibition, in justice to my own convictions, and to what history teaches me, I cannot recommend it.
