#### DANGEROUS HOBO ARRESTED.

Winnipeg, July 26.—Inquiry is now being made into the merits of the deal between the C.P.R. and the Dominion Government to see whether the country or the corporation is going to get the best of it. The Government is establishing a timber reserve in Pembina Mountain district, comprising over 100,000 acres. The C.P.R. holds odd numbered sections, and to secure all the land the Government is giving the C.P.R. in exchange for holdings in the timber district cancelled time sales in other sections of the province, much of which land is worth from \$8 to \$10 per acre. The C.P.R. proposes to exchange 50,000 acres, so it will be seen that the amount involved is considerable. There are those who say the C.P.R. lands in Pembina Mountains are scrubby, of little use for timber purchases, and far from the value of lands about to be given in exchange by the government. The matter will be threshed out by the newspapers here.

The Late Mrs. Lynn Linton.

London Daily Mail.

Mrs. Lynn Linton, who has just died at her residence at Malvern, was not only one of the most widely read novelists of out time, but will be for iong remembered as one of the most pungent critice of her sex. She was born at Keswick on Feb. 10, 1822, her father being vicar of Crosthwalte, and her mother the daughter of Bishon Goodenough of Carlisie.

She was somewhat of a "revolting daughter" and spent more time among her father's well-stocked bookshelves than he approved. She early formed an ambition to have a career, which likewise scandalized her family. For those times she was decidedly "advanced."

She came to London when 23 years of age, and began her story-writing with "Asseth," the Egyptian. This she followed up with "Amymone: A Romance of the Days of Perfcles," which she brought out with the enquiragement and advice of Waiter Savage Landor. Among her best-known earlier works are: "Witch Stories," "Grasp Your Nettic" (1885), and "Ourselves: Essays on Women." It was, however, with the publication in 1872 of "The True History of Joshua Davidson" that her mame was really made: and no long interval clapsed before this book was followed by "Patricla Kemball," "The World Well Lost," "Under Which Lord?" "With a Silken Thread," "Christopher Kirkiand," and many more.

Mrs. Lynn Linton, even after reaching the allotted span of three score years and ten, was still very busy with her pen. Till very nearly the last she worked hard, alternating her work with exercise and rest.
