DEPRESSED DAY IN WHEAT

Heavy Reaction in Futures on the Chicago Board.

Liverpool Cables Much Lower and Continental Markets Unchanged—Corn Prices Depressed Also—Local Grain, Produce and Live Stock—Notes and Gossip.

Tuesday Evening, March 28.
Liverpool wheat futures to-day eased off and closed 1/4d to 1/2d below yesterday's final figures.
Paris wheat was steady to-day to 5 centimes lower, and flour 15 to 30 centimes lower.

Chicago wheat market to-day reacted, prices for futures losing most of yesterday's advance. Lower cables and more favorable crop reports precipitated a lot of selling orders, and the May option declined 1/2c. The Northwest gave some support. The close was near the low point for the day.
Liverpool make futures declined 1/2d per cent to-day. Chicago corn declined 3/4c to-day and closed near the bottom.

Flour advanced 3d at Liverpool to-day. Bacon is higher at Liverpool.
These advances another 6d at Liverpool to-day.
Wheat receipts at Liverpool the past three days, 125,000 cwt., all American. Corn same time, 165,700 cwt.

Wheat receipts at Minneapolis and Du-

luth to-day, 514 cars, against 273 the corresponding day of 1898.
Bradstreet reports a decrease of 730,000 bushels in the world's visible supply of wheat the past week. Europe and Asia decreased 1,100,000 bushels, and east of the Rockies increased 310,000 bushels. Corn decreased 122,000 for the week, and oats increased 111,000 bushels.

Prine says: The winter wheat situation as the season advances continues one of more or less uncertainty and doubt as to its final results. Had more had reports this week with regard to crop than in any previous week during March. This much can be said in favor of crop as a whole, that the ground keeps full of moisture.
Exports at New York to-day: Flour, 2288 barrels and 3306 sacks; wheat, 31,573 bush.

ST. LAWRENCE MARKET.

Receipts of farm produce were fair to-day. 1250 bushels of grain, 20 loads of hay, 8 of straw, several loads of potatoes and a large number of dressed hogs.
Wheat flour, 300 bushels sold as follows: White, 70c to 70 1/2c; red, 70c and goose, 65c to 66c.
Barley steady; 200 bushels selling at 45c; oats unchanged; 700 bushels sold at 34c to 35c.
120 bushels of blue feed for purposes sold at 30c.
Hay: 20 loads sold at \$9 to \$10 for timothy and \$8 to \$9 per ton for clover or mixed hay.
Straw earlier, at \$5.50 to \$5.75 per ton, for the general run.
Potatoes—Potatoes plentiful in the morning, a few choice lots brought 90c to 95c per bag, but as soon as the dealers saw that a large quantity was coming forward, prices dropped to 80c per bush, and some few sold at 75c. The bulk, however, brought about 80c to 85c.

LOCAL LIVE STOCK.
Receipts of live stock were fairly large—25 local, 1500 head of cattle, 450 sheep, 1500 hogs and 40 calves.
Quality of fat cattle better than for many markets. Trade good, although not as brisk, particularly for butchers' cattle, as on Friday last. Prices firm at quotations given below.
Export Cattle—On account of dealers having space to fill on the boats, fancy prices were paid for a few extra loads of heavy cattle, well finished. Choice loads of heavy exporters sold at \$4.85 to \$5.00 per cwt. Choice picked lots of heavy exporters brought 15c to 25c more than these prices, but were few in number.
Loads of good butchers' and exporters, mixed, sold at \$4.50 to \$4.65 per cwt.
Export Hogs—Choice heavy export hogs of good quality sold at \$3.85 to \$4.25, and bulls, medium, of export grade, sold at \$3.60 to \$3.75 per cwt.

best exporters, sold at \$4.40 to \$4.65 per cwt.
Loads of good butchers' cattle sold at \$4.40 to \$4.50, with medium at \$4 to \$4.25 per cwt.
Common butchers' cattle sold at \$3.60 to \$3.75, with inferior at \$3.40 to \$3.50 per cwt.
Very inferior rough cows and bulls sold at \$3.20 to \$3.40 per cwt.
Feeding Bull—Deliveries light, with prices firm at \$3.50 to \$3.80 for general run, and as high as \$4 for choice bred steers.
Feeder—Heavy feeders, weighing 1000 to 1150 lbs., scarce and worth from \$4.15 to \$4.30 per cwt.
Stock Heifers—A few heifers for stock purposes sold at \$3 per cwt.
Stock Bulls—Inferior stock bulls sold at \$2.50 per cwt.
Feeding Bulls—Bulls suitable for the byres are worth about \$3 to \$3.25 per cwt.
Calves—About 40 calves sold at \$2 to \$10 each, but the bulk went at \$3 to \$8 each.
Sheep—About 450 sheep and lambs came forward. Ewes sold at \$3 to \$3.50; bucks, \$2.50 to \$2.75 per cwt.
Yearling lambs were more plentiful, selling at \$4.75 to \$5 per cwt., with a few choice picked lots of ewes and wethers at \$5 to \$6 per cwt.
Spring lambs—These were plentiful. Many of them were too small, and ought to have been left a month longer with their mothers. Prices ranged from \$3 to \$9 each for the bulk.
Milk Cows—About 18 cows came forward, 1500 head of cattle, 450 sheep, 1500 hogs and 40 calves.
Hogs—About 1500 hogs came in, and, as The World predicted, prices for light and thick fats were 12 1/2c per cwt. lower than last week's quotations. Choice selections, weighing from 100 to 200 lbs., mixed and unwashed, off ears, were quoted at \$4.20; light, at \$4, and thick fats at \$3.75 per cwt. It was expected by the dealers that when the Park, Blackwell Company got established and in full blast they would be a change for the better in prices, and competition on this market. But many of the dealers said that they have failed to see any improvement in this respect.
One dealer sold this firm 100 hogs, out of which there were only 28 selecters, 64 lights and 8 fats, receiving \$4.50 for the selecters, \$4 for light fats and \$3.75 for thick fats, or an average of \$4.15 per cwt. all round. Mr. Harris complained of too many light hogs coming forward.
The pulling price for unculled carlots was

T. G. Colwell sold 10 exporters, 1225 lbs. each, at \$5; one bull, 1520 lbs., at \$4.50, and two picked butchers' cattle, 1020 lbs. each, at \$4.00 per cwt.
William Murry bought one load of exporters, 1250 lbs. each, at \$5 per cwt.
