### IN THE COMMONS

**Postmaster-General Mulock Re-introduces His Gerrymander Bill Which the Senate Killed.**

The House always opens with prayers read in a sober, slow tone by Speaker Bain; the Assistant Clerk then reads a batch of petitions in two tongues; the slate is cleared of preliminaries. 'Twas even so this afternoon at 3.

Sir Charles Tupper was absent from the House, and Sir Adolphe Caron was in command of the Opposition.

After seven bills were said to be unnecessary, Sir Louis Davies introduced a bill to further amend the Pilotage Act. It relates entirely to the harbor of Montreal, and proposes an independent pilotage committee consisting of three persons, one of whom must have pilotage experience. It aims to remedy all the grievances of pilots. It was read a first time.

Again Sir Louis had the floor with a bill to amend the act respecting the safety of ships. It met the generous fate of its predecessor.

**A Gerrymander Bill.**  
Another tussle with a gerrymander bill is in sight. For Hon. Mr. Mulock is to the fore with a bill. His bill is an old acquaintance. True it is one year older, but it is the same old bill. Introduced in 1898, he said it was his redistribution bill of last session. Speaking of the fate the bill received last year, he thought it should have a better treatment at the hands of the Senators. He denounces the measures of 1882 and 1892 as travesties upon representative institutions. He held out as a remedy his own bill. He hoped the Senate would not strain their right and veto it. He held a post mortem on the bill, and thought it was a stupor from which it should be awakened. A partisan body, would be in accord with the provisions of this bill, and his sole hope rested with the new blood that has been infused into the honorable and venerable body.

**Called It a Farce.**  
Mr. Clarke Wallace replied to the P.M.G. and considered the bill on its merits. He said a farce, for if it were passed in 1900, another would have to be passed in 1902. He characterized the intent of the bill as outrageous. The clause relating to the judgment of the House was absurd, for it would be working in the dark on the basis of the census of 1891, whereas in his own constituency the population had increased from 28,000 to 41,000 since that date.
