

BIG COMPANY FORMED IN TORONTO TO GET THE DRESSED MEAT TRADE

**Capital is One Million Dollars, and Messrs. William Harris & Sons
and the William Davies Company Have Launched the
Harris Abattoir Company on a Firm Basis.**

A company with a capital of a million dollars has been formed in Toronto to deal in dressed meats in the markets of Canada and Great Britain.

For several years that American firms have been successfully shipping dressed meats to the United Kingdom. The fact is substantiated by evidence that has not been seen in Toronto in the large shipments from Armour & Swift and other American firms. Small retail shipments are made to the United Kingdom from time to time by individual Canadians, but not on a large scale.

Up to the present the bulk of the beef consumed in the British markets has been sent on foot, and out of the many that have been engaged in this trade there are few that have made money, many having

The price of meat on the English markets to a large extent is ruled by the large and ever-increasing dressed meat trade from South America, Australia and the United States.

TWO MONSTER BATTLESHIPS AND AN ARMORED CRUISER LAUNCHED

British Naval Strength Immensely Augmented Since the Accession of King Edward—A Fourth Warship Was Ready, But the Weather Was Too Stormy at Portsmouth.

London, March 5.—Arrangements had been made for the simultaneous launching to-day of four new warships, the Monagu, first-

ther at Portsmouth, the launching of the Monagu had to be postponed.

The three new vessels aggregate a displacement of 10,000 tons, 12,000, 12,000, and 12,000 tons, respectively.

That Was the Allegation of Mr. Bennett of East Simcoe When He Saw James G. Jardine.

DID JARDINE POST MR. FISHER?

A Little Excitement in the Commons During the Late Hours of Last Evening.

Ottawa, March 10 (Special).—An exciting scene occurred in the Home about 11.30 this evening. Hon. Sydney Fisher was defending the position of James G. Jardine at the Paris Exposition, when Mr. Bennett of East Simcoe asked if Jardine was the same person who was attached to the Ontario machine.

Mr. Fisher replied that he did not know, but he had been told that Mr. Jardine had met Mr. Bennett on the platform, and had taken the charge out of him.

Mr. Bennett then took the floor, and the members of the House of Representatives took the "Master's" desks on the floor of the chamber, whispering to Mr. Flint.

Mr. Bennett rose and called attention to Jardine's presence. He said he had been told that Mr. Jardine had taken the charge out of him, and he was glad to hear that Mr. Bennett had taken it up.

Mr. Bennett then read a statement of the ownership of the city of Minneapolis, and the wisdom of public ownership and operation of public utilities has again been demonstrated. On Feb. 27, 1900, the city of Minneapolis had a population of 100,000, and the city owned the street lighting, the electric street lighting, and also the lighting of all civic buildings by the same power. The result has proved more satisfactory than any other system of public ownership.

Fisher had been communicated by Jardine, but it was both deliberately false and maliciously untrue. He then denounced Jardine as a member of the "Cap." and several members connected him with "Cap." Sullivan.
