

Hamilton, Feb. 2.—A deputation composed of many of the most ardent supporters of the enterprise met at Hotel Royal this afternoon to confer with Col. Otter in regard to the formation of the proposed Kiltie regiment. Col. Otter, in opening the meeting, said that he had received application for the formation of the regiment, and had forwarded it to Ottawa without his report, as up to the present time he had no chance of investigating the matter.
